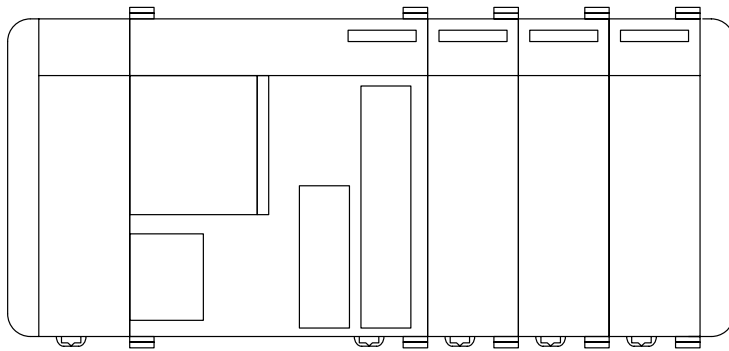

The abbreviation “PC” means Programmable Controller and is not used as an abbreviation for anything else.

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About this Manual:

The CQM1 is a compact, high-speed Programmable Controller (PC) designed for advanced control operations in systems requiring from 16 to 256 I/O points per PC. There are two manuals describing the setup and operation of the CQM1: The *CQM1 Operation Manual* (this manual) and the *CQM1 Programming Manual*. Also available is the *CQM1-series Dedicated I/O Units Operation Manual*.

This manual describes the system configuration and installation of the CQM1 and provides an basic explanation of operating procedures for the Programming Consoles and introduces the capabilities of the Ladder Support Software (LSS) and SYSMAC Support Software (SSS). Read this manual first to acquaint yourself with the CQM1.

The *CQM1 Programming Manual* provides detailed descriptions of the CQM1's programming functions. The *Ladder Support Software Operation Manual* and the *SYSMAC Support Software Operation Manual: C-series PCs* provides descriptions of LSS and SSS operations for the CQM1 and C-series PCs. Use Version-3 LSS or a later version for CQM1 operation.

Please read this manual carefully and be sure you understand the information provide before attempting to install and operate the CQM1.

Section 1 gives a brief overview of the steps involved in developing of a CQM1 System, describes the possible system configurations, and describes the CQM1's special features and functions.

Section 2 describes the Units that go together to create a CQM1 PC and provides information on switch settings, installation, and hardware maintenance. Technical specifications of the Units are also provided.

Section 3 describes LSS/SSS capabilities, how to connect the Programming Console, and how to perform the various Programming Console operations.

Section 4 describes how to diagnose and correct the hardware and software errors that can occur during PC operation.

The **Appendix** provides tables of CQM1 Units and related products.



WARNING Failure to read and understand the information provided in this manual may result in personal injury or death, damage to the product, or product failure. Please read each section in its entirety and be sure you understand the information provided in the section and related sections before attempting any of the procedures or operations given.

PRECAUTIONS

This section provides general precautions for using the Programmable Controller (PC) and related devices.

The information contained in this section is important for the safe and reliable application of the Programmable Controller. You must read this section and understand the information contained before attempting to set up or operate a PC system.

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1 Intended Audience

This manual is intended for the following personnel, who must also have knowledge of electrical systems (an electrical engineer or the equivalent).

- Personnel in charge of installing FA systems.
- Personnel in charge of designing FA systems.
- Personnel in charge of managing FA systems and facilities.

2 General Precautions

The user must operate the product according to the performance specifications described in the operation manuals.

Before using the product under conditions which are not described in the manual or applying the product to nuclear control systems, railroad systems, aviation systems, vehicles, combustion systems, medical equipment, amusement machines, safety equipment, and other systems, machines, and equipment that may have a serious influence on lives and property if used improperly, consult your OMRON representative.

Make sure that the ratings and performance characteristics of the product are sufficient for the systems, machines, and equipment, and be sure to provide the systems, machines, and equipment with double safety mechanisms.

This manual provides information for programming and operating the Unit. Be sure to read this manual before attempting to use the Unit and keep this manual close at hand for reference during operation.

 **WARNING** It is extremely important that a PC and all PC Units be used for the specified purpose and under the specified conditions, especially in applications that can directly or indirectly affect human life. You must consult with your OMRON representative before applying a PC System to the above-mentioned applications.

3 Safety Precautions

 **WARNING** Do not attempt to take any Unit apart while the power is being supplied. Doing so may result in electric shock.

 **WARNING** Do not touch any of the terminals while the power is being supplied. Doing so may result in electric shock.

 **WARNING** Do not attempt to disassemble, repair, or modify any Units. Any attempt to do so may result in malfunction, fire, or electric shock.

 **Caution** Tighten the screws on the terminal block of the AC Power Supply Unit to the torque specified in the manual. Loose screws may result in burning or malfunction.

4 Operating Environment Precautions

 **Caution** Do not operate the control system in the following locations:

- Locations subject to direct sunlight.
- Locations subject to temperatures or humidity outside the range specified in the specifications.

- Locations subject to condensation as the result of severe changes in temperature.
- Locations subject to corrosive or flammable gases.
- Locations subject to dust (especially iron dust) or salts.
- Locations subject to exposure to water, oil, or chemicals.
- Locations subject to shock or vibration.

**Caution**

Take appropriate and sufficient countermeasures when installing systems in the following locations:

- Locations subject to static electricity or other forms of noise.
- Locations subject to strong electromagnetic fields.
- Locations subject to possible exposure to radioactivity.
- Locations close to power supplies.

**Caution**

The operating environment of the PC System can have a large effect on the longevity and reliability of the system. Improper operating environments can lead to malfunction, failure, and other unforeseeable problems with the PC System. Be sure that the operating environment is within the specified conditions at installation and remains within the specified conditions during the life of the system.

5 Application Precautions

Observe the following precautions when using the PC System.

**WARNING**

Always heed these precautions. Failure to abide by the following precautions could lead to serious or possibly fatal injury.

- Always connect to a class-3 ground (to 100 Ω or less) when installing the Units. Not connecting to a class-3 ground may result in electric shock.
- Always turn OFF the power supply to the PC before attempting any of the following. Not turning OFF the power supply may result in malfunction or electric shock.
 - Mounting or dismounting I/O Units, CPU Units, Memory Cassettes, or any other Units.
 - Assembling the Units.
 - Setting DIP switches or rotary switches.
 - Connecting or wiring the cables.
 - Connecting or disconnecting the connectors.

**Caution**

Failure to abide by the following precautions could lead to faulty operation of the PC or the system, or could damage the PC or PC Units. Always heed these precautions.

- Fail-safe measures must be taken by the customer to ensure safety in the event of incorrect, missing, or abnormal signals caused by broken signal lines, momentary power interruptions, or other causes.
- Interlock circuits, limit circuits, and similar safety measures in external circuits (i.e., not in the Programmable Controller) must be provided by the customer.
- Always use the power supply voltage specified in the manual. An incorrect voltage may result in malfunction or burning.
- Take appropriate measures to ensure that the specified power with the rated voltage and frequency is supplied. Be particularly careful in places where the power supply is unstable. An incorrect power supply may result in malfunction.

- Install external breakers and take other safety measures against short-circuiting in external wiring. Insufficient safety measures against short-circuiting may result in burning.
- Do not apply voltages to the Input Units in excess of the rated input voltage. Excess voltages may result in burning.
- Do not apply voltages or connect loads to the Output Units in excess of the maximum switching capacity. Excess voltage or loads may result in burning.
- Disconnect the functional ground terminal when performing withstand voltage tests. Not disconnecting the functional ground terminal may result in burning.
- Install and wire the Unit properly as specified in the manual. Improper installation of the Unit may result in malfunction.
- Be sure that all the mounting screws, terminal screws, and cable connector screws are tightened to the torque specified in the relevant manuals. Incorrect tightening torque may result in malfunction.
- Leave the label attached to the Unit when wiring. Removing the label may result in malfunction.
- Remove the label after the completion of wiring to ensure proper heat dissipation. Leaving the label attached may result in malfunction.
- Use crimp terminals for wiring. Do not connect bare stranded wires directly to terminals. Connection of bare stranded wires may result in burning.
- Double-check all the wiring before turning ON the power supply. Incorrect wiring may result in burning.
- Mount the Unit only after checking the terminal block completely.
- Be sure that the terminal blocks, Memory Units, expansion cables, and other items with locking devices are properly locked into place. Improper locking may result in malfunction.
- Check the user program for proper execution before actually running it on the Unit. Not checking the program may result in an unexpected operation.
- Confirm that no adverse effect will occur in the system before attempting any of the following. Not doing so may result in an unexpected operation.
 - Changing the operating mode of the PC.
 - Force-setting/force-resetting any bit in memory.
 - Changing the present value of any word or any set value in memory.
- Do not pull on the cables or bend the cables beyond their natural limit. Doing either of these may break the cables.

6 Conformance to EC Directives

The CQM1 PCs comply with EC Directives. To ensure that the machine or device in which a CQM1 PC is used complies with EC Directives, the PC must be installed as follows:

- 1, 2, 3...** 1. The PC must be installed within a control panel.
2. Reinforced insulation or double insulation must be used for the DC power supplies used for the communications and I/O power supplies.
3. PCs complying with EC Directives also conform to the Common Emission Standard (EN50081-2). When a PC is built into a machine, however, noise can be generated by switching devices using relay outputs and cause the overall machine to fail to meet the Standard. If this occurs, surge killers must be connected or other measures taken external to the PC.

The following methods represent typical methods for reducing noise, and may not be sufficient in all cases. Required countermeasures will vary depending on the devices connected to the control panel, wiring, the configuration of the system, and other conditions.

Determining if Countermeasures Are Required

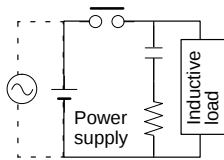
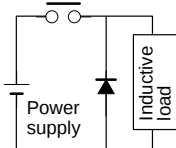
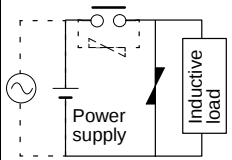

Countermeasures are not required if the frequency of load switching for the whole system including the PC is less than 5 times per minute.

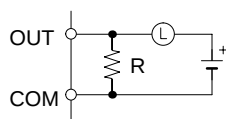
Countermeasures are required if the frequency of load switching for the whole system including the PC is more than 5 times per minute.

Countermeasure Examples

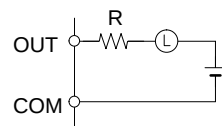
When switching an inductive load, connect an surge protector, diodes, etc., in parallel with the load or contact as shown below.

Circuit	Current		Characteristic	Required element

CR method 	Yes	Yes	If the load is a relay or solenoid, there is a time lag between the moment the circuit is opened and the moment the load is reset. If the supply voltage is 24 or 48 V, insert the surge protector in parallel with the load. If the supply voltage is 100 to 200 V, insert the surge protector between the contacts.	The capacitance of the capacitor must be 1 to 0.5 μF per contact current of 1 A and resistance of the resistor must be 0.5 to 1 Ω per contact voltage of 1 V. These values, however, vary with the load and the characteristics of the relay. Decide these values from testing, and take into consideration that the capacitance suppresses spark discharge when the contacts are separated and the resistance limits the current that flows into the load when the circuit is closed again. The dielectric strength of the capacitor must be 200 to 300 V. If the circuit is an AC circuit, use a capacitor with no polarity.
Diode method 	No	Yes	The diode connected in parallel with the load changes energy accumulated by the coil into a current, which then flows into the coil so that the current will be converted into Joule heat by the resistance of the inductive load. This time lag, between the moment the circuit is opened and the moment the load is reset, caused by this method is longer than that caused by the CR method.	The reversed dielectric strength value of the diode must be at least 10 times as large as the circuit voltage value. The forward current of the diode must be the same as or larger than the load current. The reversed dielectric strength value of the diode may be two to three times larger than the supply voltage if the surge protector is applied to electronic circuits with low circuit voltages.
Varistor method 	Yes	Yes	The varistor method prevents the imposition of high voltage between the contacts by using the constant voltage characteristic of the varistor. There is time lag between the moment the circuit is opened and the moment the load is reset. If the supply voltage is 24 or 48 V, insert the varistor in parallel with the load. If the supply voltage is 100 to 200 V, insert the varistor between the contacts.	---

When switching a load with a high inrush current, such as an incandescent lamp, suppress the inrush current as shown below.

Providing a dark current of approx. one-third of the rated value through an incandescent lamp

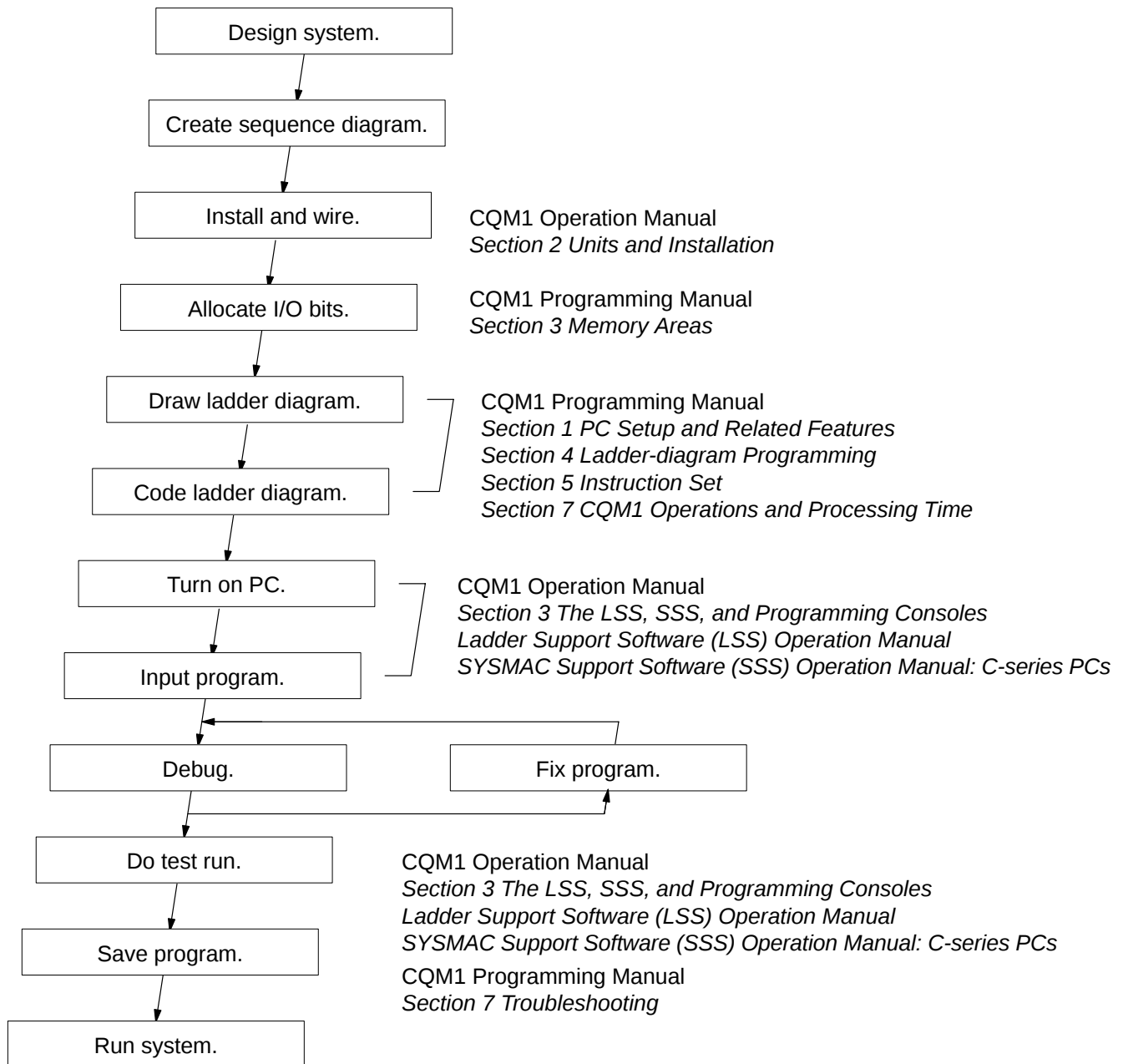
Introduction

This section gives a brief overview of the steps involved in developing of a CQM1 System, describes the possible system configurations, and describes the CQM1’s special features and functions.

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1-1 Overview

The following diagram shows the steps involved in setting up and operating a CQM1 System and the sections in this and the *CQM1 Programming Manual* that will be most useful at each step.

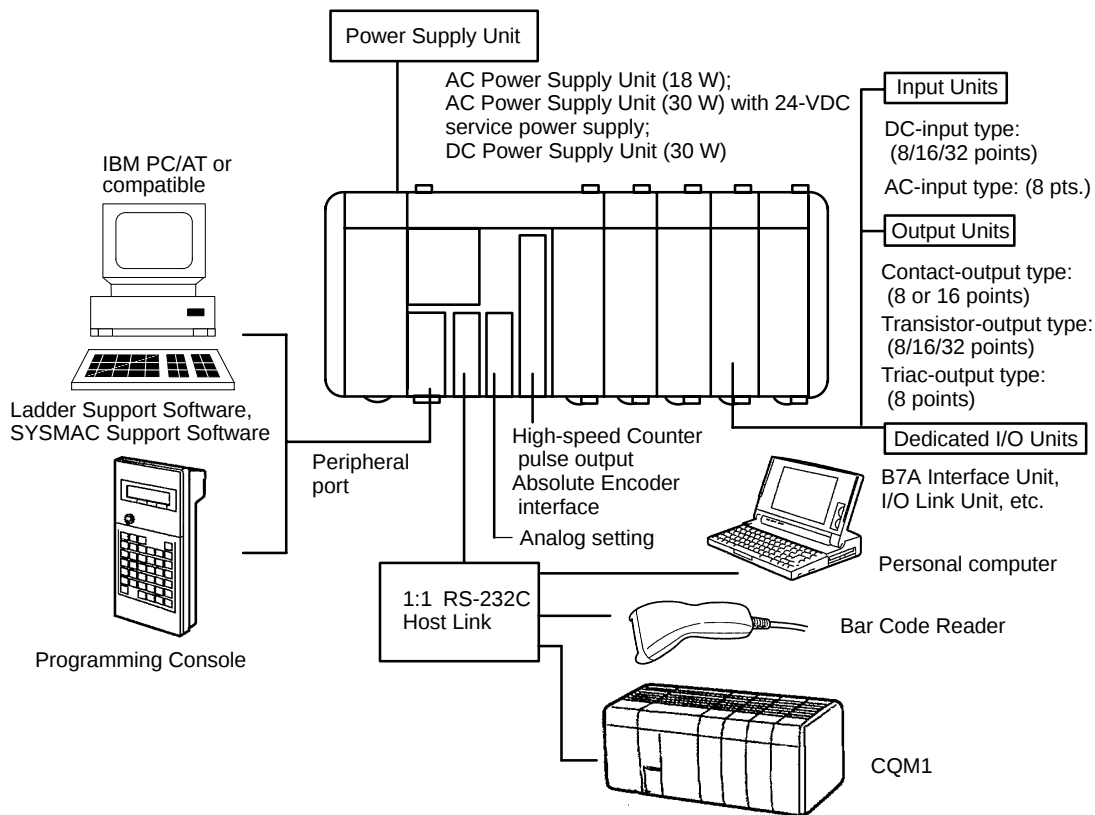


1-2 System Configuration

The CQM1 is a compact, high-speed PC composed of a Power Supply Unit, a CPU Unit, and I/O Units. All of these Units connect at the sides to form a single PC, which is normally mounted to a DIN track.

All CQM1 CPU Units, except for the CQM1-CPU11-E, are equipped with an RS-232C port that can be connected directly to a host computer, another CQM1, or other serial devices.

The following diagram shows the system configurations possible with the CQM1. Refer to *Section 2 Hardware Considerations* for more details on system components and specifications.



1-3 CQM1 Features

Main Features

The CQM1 provides many advanced features, including the following:

- The CPU Unit provides 16 built-in input terminals.
- I/O Units can be added to increase I/O capacity.
- The CQM1 is much faster: about 20 times faster than P-type PCs.
- High-speed timers and counters are built in.
- Outputs are processed when instructions are executed (direct outputs).

Interrupts	The CQM1 supports three types of interrupts: • Input Interrupts Input interrupts are used to process input signals from an external device that are shorter than the program execution time. Input signals with a pulse width as short as 0.1 ms can be used. • Scheduled Interrupts Scheduled interrupts can be performed using a high-speed interval timer. • High-speed Counter Interrupts Single-phase pulses up to 5 kHz and two-phase pulses up to 2.5 kHz can be input. High-speed counter interrupts can be combined with pulse outputs for applications such as motor control. The CQM1-CPU43-EV1 and CQM1-CPU44-EV1 can accept single-phase pulses up to 50 kHz and two-phase pulses up to 25 kHz. The high-speed counter (absolute encoder input for the CPU44-EV1) has two points added.
Pulse Output Function	Pulses up to 1 kHz can be output from Output Unit contacts. The CQM1-CPU43-EV1 has two dedicated ports for outputting 50 kHz pulses.
Communications	A peripheral port and RS-232C port are available and are used to communicate with external devices using the following methods. • Host Link The CQM1 using the host link can communicate with a personal computer and Programmable Terminal using host link commands. • RS-232C The CQM1 using the RS-232C can read data from a bar code reader or measurement device and output data to a printer. • 1-to-1 Link A data link can be created with a data area in another CQM1 to monitor the other PC's status and synchronize processes controlled by the PCs.
Analog Setting Function	The CQM1-CPU42-EV1 provides volume controls with four channels for adjusting analog settings.
Convenient I/O Instructions	A single instruction can be used to input or output data, simplifying the program. • The TEN KEY INPUT instruction can be used to read 8-digit BCD data input from a ten-key. • The HEXADECIMAL KEY INPUT instruction can be used to read 8-digit hexadecimal key input data from I/O Units. • The DIGITAL SWITCH instruction can be used to read 4 or 8-digit BCD data from digital switches. • The 7-SEGMENT DISPLAY OUTPUT instruction can be used to output 4 or 8-digit data to 7-segment displays.
Macros	The MACRO instruction can be used to call and execute subroutines, designating the I/O word for the subroutine as an argument. Using an argument to specify a subroutine I/O words allows subroutines to be used more easily in different locations, simplifying the program.
Differentiation Monitoring	Up to now, differentiation monitoring was available only in top-of-the-line PCs. Differentiation monitoring indicates when a bit goes from OFF to ON or from ON to OFF. It can be used to monitor the status of inputs or bits that turn on and off in very short intervals.

SECTION 2

Units and Installation

This section describes the Units that go together to create a CQM1 PC and provides information on switch settings, installation, and hardware maintenance. Technical specifications of the Units are also provided.

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2-1 CPU Unit

The CQM1 is a compact, high-speed PC made up of a CPU Unit, Power Supply Unit, and I/O Units that together provide up to 256 total I/O points. These components lock together at the sides, allowing simple changes in the size and capacity of the PC. There are six types of CPU Unit, shown in the table below. All of the CPU Units except for the CQM1-CPU11-E have a built-in RS-232C interface.

CQM1-CPU11-E and CQM1-CPU21-E CPU Units

CQM1-CPU11-E and CQM1-CPU21-E CPU Units provide a maximum of 128 I/O points. The only difference between the two models is the RS-232C port that is added to the CQM1-CPU21-E.

Built-in Analog Setting Function

The CQM1-CPU42-EV1 CPU Unit provides a built-in analog setting function. It has four dedicated volume controls, and their respective values (0 to 200 BCD) appear in words 220 to 223. This function can be used for operations such as changing timer and counter set values during operation.

Built-in Pulse I/O Function

The CQM1-CPU43-EV1 CPU Unit provides a built-in pulse input and output function. It has two dedicated ports for high-speed counting of up to 25-kHz two-phase pulse inputs from a device such as a rotary encoder and outputting up to 50-kHz pulses to a device such as a stepping motor.

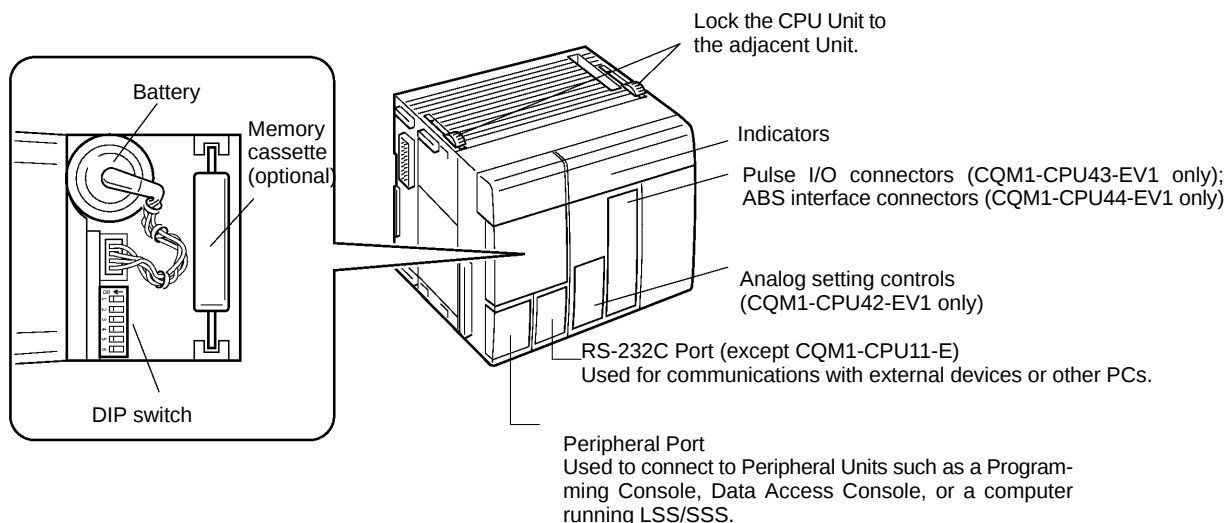
Built-in ABS Interface Function

The CQM1-CPU44-EV1 has two ABS interfaces (absolute encoder interfaces) that can directly receive inputs from absolute-type rotary encoders.

Note In this manual, CQM1-CPU11-E/21-E CPU Units are referred to as “standard CPU Units,” and CQM1-CPU41-EV1/42-EV1/43-EV1/44-EV1 CPU Units are referred to as “highly functional, large-capacity CPU Units.”

2-1-1 CPU Unit Components

The following diagram shows the basic components of the CPU Unit that are used in general operation of the PC.



2-1-2 DIP Switch

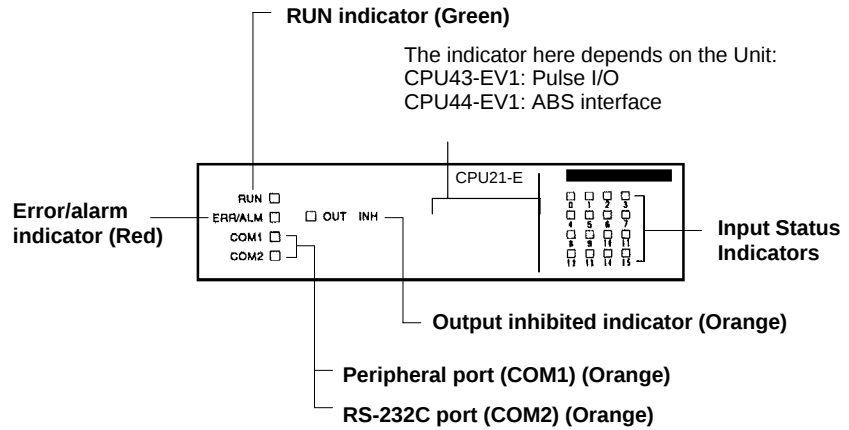
The DIP switch is located under a cover on the front of the CPU Unit as shown in 2-1-1 CPU Unit Components. The setting of these switches is described in the following table.

1. All DIP switch pins except pin 3 are turned OFF at the factory.
 2. The above settings apply to CPU Units manufactured from July 1995 (lot number □□75 for July 1995). For CPU Units manufactured before July 1995 (lot number □□65 for June 1995), only 1 stop bit will be set and the baud rate will be 2,400 bps.
 3. Pin 6 can be used to control the status of AR 0712 in memory to provide optional control of program execution.

2-1-3 Indicators

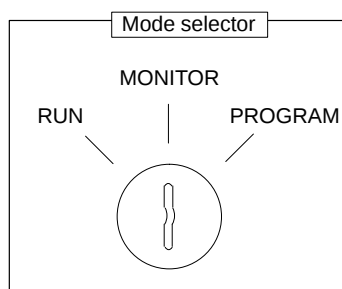
CPU Unit indicators provide visual information on the general operation of the PC. Although not substitutes for proper error programming using the flags and other error indicators provided in the data areas of memory, these indicators provide ready confirmation of proper operation. CPU Unit indicators are shown below and are described in the following table.



Indicator	Name	Function
RUN	RUN indicator	Lights when the CPU Unit is operating normally.
ERR/ALM	Error/Alarm indicator	Flashes when there is a non-fatal error. The CPU Unit will continue operating. Lit when there is a fatal error. When this indicator lights, the RUN indicator will go off, CPU Unit operation will be stopped, and all outputs will be turned OFF.
COM1	Peripheral port indicator	Flashes when the CPU Unit is communicating with another device via the peripheral port.
COM2	RS-232C port indicator	Flashes when the CPU Unit is communicating with another device via the RS-232C port. (CQM1-CPU21-E only)
OUT INH	Output inhibited indicator	Lights when the Output OFF Bit, SR 25215, is turned ON. All PC outputs will be turned OFF.
0, 1, 2 . . .	Input status indicators	Indicate the ON and OFF status of input bits in IR 000.

2-1-4 PC Modes

The CQM1 PCs have three operating modes: PROGRAM, MONITOR, and RUN. The PC mode can be changed from the mode selector on the Programming Console.



The key cannot be removed when the mode selector is set to PROGRAM.

Note Some Programming Devices (e.g., the Programming Console) will clear the current display and display the new operating mode when the mode selector is changed. You can change the mode without changing the display by first pressing the SHIFT Key and then changing the setting of the mode selector.

The function of each mode is described briefly below.

PROGRAM Mode

PROGRAM mode is used when making basic changes to the PC program or settings, such as transferring, writing, editing, or checking the program, or changing the PC Setup. The program cannot be executed in PROGRAM mode. Output points at Output Units will remain OFF, even when the corresponding output bit is ON.

MONITOR Mode

MONITOR mode is used when monitoring program execution, such as making a trial run of a program. The program is executed just as it is in RUN mode, but bit status, timer and counter SV/PV, and the data content of most words can be changed online. Output points at Output Units will be turned ON when the corresponding output bit is ON.

RUN Mode

RUN mode is used when operating the PC in normal control conditions. Bit status cannot be force set or reset, and SVs, PVs, and data cannot be changed online.

Note When a program section is displayed on the Programming Console and the PC is in RUN or MONITOR Mode, the ON/OFF status of bits in that program section will be displayed in the upper-right corner of the display.

Mode Changes

The factors that determine the initial operating mode of the PC (the mode when the PC is turned on) are listed below in order of importance.

1, 2, 3...

1. No Devices mounted:

If no Peripheral Devices are mounted to the PC, the PC will enter RUN mode when turned ON unless the startup mode setting in the PC Setup (DM 6600) has been set to MONITOR or PROGRAM Mode.

2. Programming Console mounted:

If the Programming Console is connected to the PC when PC power is applied, the PC will enter the mode set on the Programming Console's mode selector.

3. Other Peripheral Device mounted:

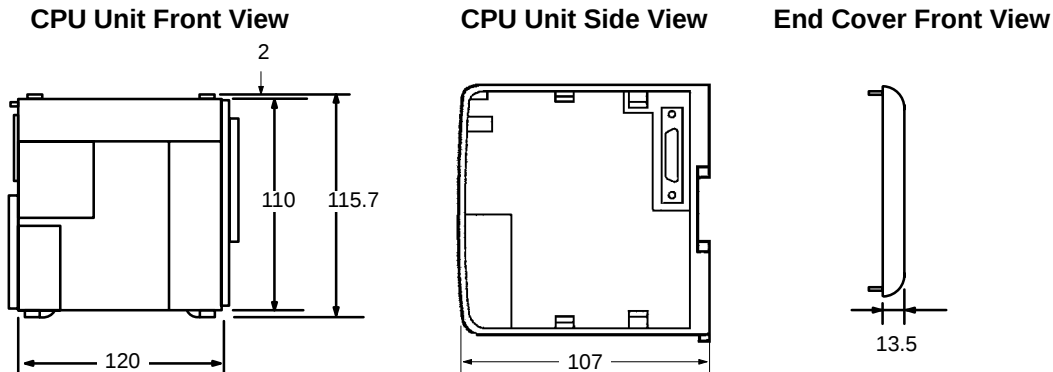
If a Programming Console is not mounted to the PC, but another Peripheral Device is connected to the PC, the PC will enter PROGRAM mode.

If the PC power supply is already turned on when a Peripheral Device is attached to the PC, the PC will stay in the same mode it was in before the peripheral device was attached. If the Programming Console is connected, the PC will enter the mode set on the Programming Console's mode selector once the password has been entered.

2-1-5 Dimensions and Weights

Dimensions

The following diagrams show the dimensions of the CPU Unit and right End Cover, which covers the Unit at the far right side of the PC. All dimensions are in millimeters.



Note The depth is the same for all Units.

Weights

The CQM1-CPU11-E weighs 520 g max.; the CQM1-CPU21-E and CQM1-CPU41-EV1, 530 g max. All the other CPU Units weigh 600 g max.

2-1-6 Memory Cassette

Four Memory Cassettes are available as accessories to store the program or PC Setup. When pin 2 of the CPU Unit's DIP switch is ON, the contents of the Memory Cassette will be transferred to the CPU Unit automatically at start-up.

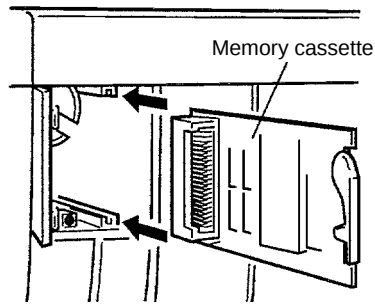

Memory Cassette Installation Follow the procedure below to install a Memory Cassette in the CPU Unit.

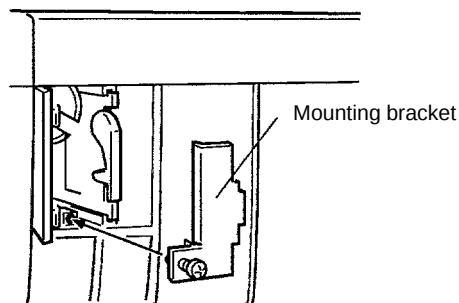
Caution Always turn off power to the CQM1 before installing or removing a Memory Cassette.

- 1, 2, 3...** 1. Remove the mounting bracket from inside the memory cassette compartment.

- Slide the Memory Cassette into the CPU Unit on the tracks provided. Press the Memory Cassette in so that the connectors fit securely.



- Replace the bracket as shown below and tighten the screw.



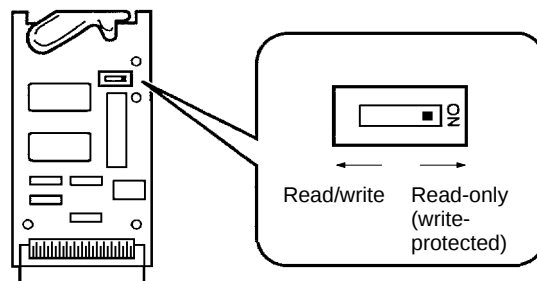
EEPROM Write Protection

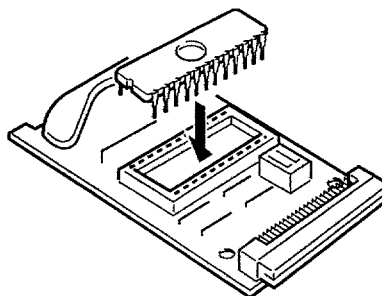

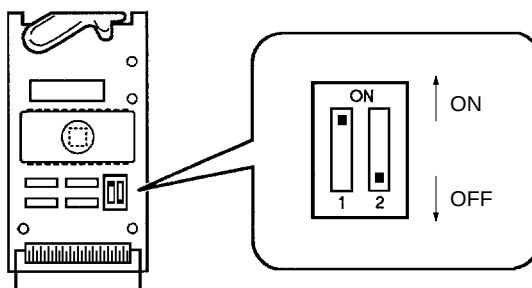

2-1-7 Battery Replacement

CQM1 CPU Units contain a 3G2A9-BAT08 Battery Set, which must be replaced when its effective life has expired. The effective life under normal conditions is approximately 5 years. The effective life will be reduced at higher temperatures. Refer to *Appendix B Battery Service Life* for more details.

A battery error will occur when the voltage of the battery starts to drop, causing the ALARM/ERROR indicator to flash, causing SR 25308 to turn ON, and generating a battery error message readable from Programming Devices. The battery must be replaced within one week after a battery error is indicated.



Caution

Replace the battery within one week after the first indication that the battery requires replacement. Always keep a spare Battery Set on hand. It will be highly unlikely that you will be able to obtain a replacement Battery Set in time otherwise. If the battery is not replaced in time, the user program and other data may be lost.

Use the following procedure to replace the battery. You must complete this procedure within five minutes after turning off the power to the CQM1 to ensure memory backup.

1, 2, 3...

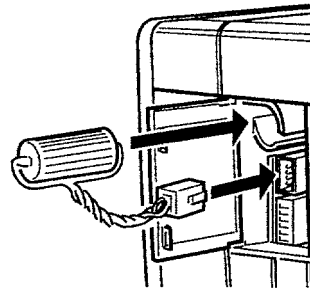
1. Turn off the power to the CQM1.

or If the CQM1 is not turned on, turn it on for at least one minute and then turn it off.

Note If power is not turned on for at least one minute before replacing the battery, the capacitor that backs up memory when the battery is

removed will not be fully charged and memory may be lost before the new battery is inserted.

2. Open the compartment on the upper left of the CPU Unit and carefully draw out the battery.
3. Remove the battery connector.
4. Connect the new battery, place it into the compartment, and close the cover.



The battery error will automatically be cleared when a new battery is inserted.

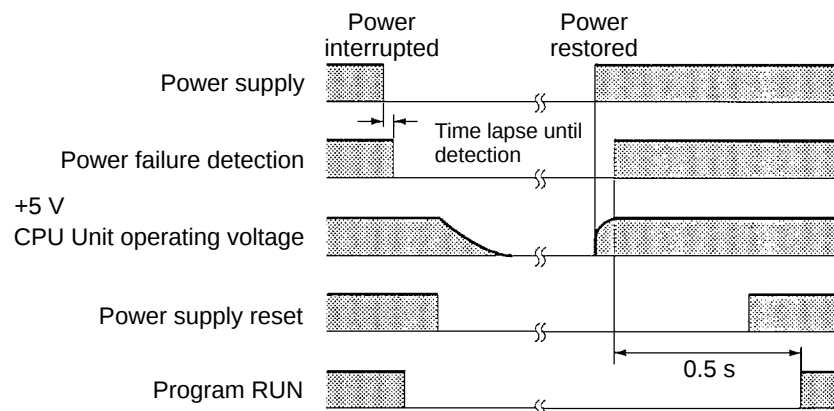
⚠ WARNING Never short-circuit the battery terminals; never charge the battery; never disassemble the battery; and never heat or incinerate the battery. Doing any of these may cause the battery to leak, burn, or rupturing resulting in injury, fire, and possible loss of life or property.

2-1-8 Programmable Controller Power Interruptions

A sequential circuit is built into the PC to handle power interruptions. This circuit prevents malfunctions due to momentary power loss or voltage drops. A timing diagram for the operation of this circuit is shown below.

The PC ignores all momentary power failures if the interruption lasts no longer than 10 ms. If the interruption lasts between 10 and 25 ms, the interruption may or may not be detected. If the supply voltage drops below 85% of the rated voltage for longer than 25 ms (less for the DC Power Supply), the PC will stop operating and the external outputs will be automatically turned OFF.

Operation is resumed automatically when the voltage is restored to more than 85% of the rated value. The diagram below shows the timing of PC operation and stopping during a power interruption. The time it takes to detect the power failure is 5 ms when the power supply is DC.

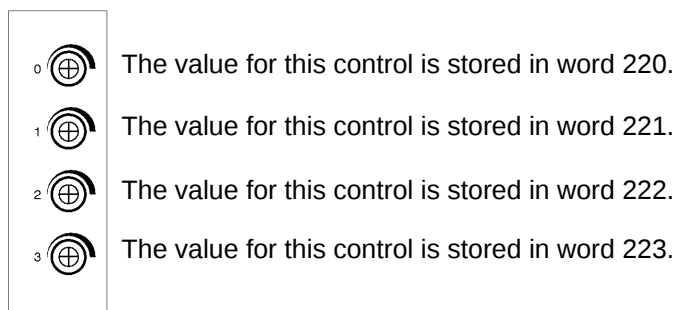


2-1-9 Analog Setting Function

The CQM1-CPU42-EV1 has four volume controls. By adjusting these controls, the contents of words 220 through 223 can be changed within a range of 0000 to 0200 (in four digits BCD). This is called the “analog setting function.”

A commercially available mini-screwdriver can be used to turn the volume controls. The value increases as they are turned in a clockwise direction.

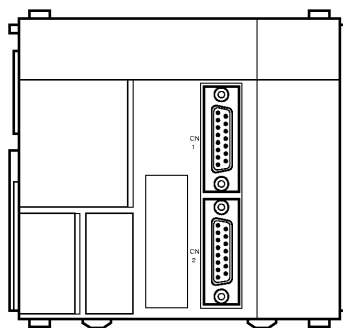
If words 220 through 223 are designated as the SV for instructions such as TIM, they cannot be used as the analog timer. With CPU Unit models other than the CQM1-CPU42-EV1, there is no particular use for words 220 through 223, and they can be used as IR words.



Caution While the power is turned on for CQM1-CPU42-EV1 CPU Units, words 220 through 223 are constantly refreshed with the values from these volume controls. Be sure that writing is not executed within this range by the program or peripheral devices.

2-1-10 Pulse I/O Function

The CQM1-CPU43-EV1 has two dedicated ports (CN1 and CN2) that can input and output high-speed pulses.



These two ports can be used to perform the functions described below.

Pulse Output

Pulses from 10 Hz to 50 kHz can be output. In comparison with pulse output from a contact, wide-frequency band pulses can be output more smoothly while changing frequencies.

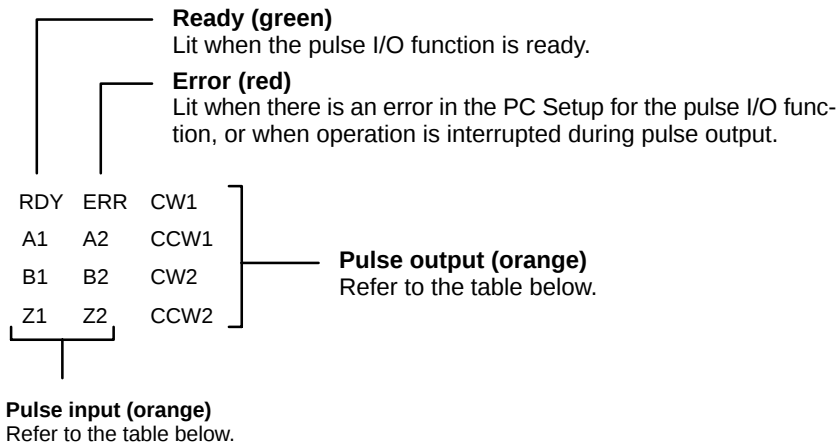
High-Speed Counter Interrupts

High-speed pulses input to the port (up to 50 kHz for single phase and 25 kHz for two-phase) can be counted, and processing can be executed according to the count. There are three kinds of count mode:

- Phase-difference pulse input mode
- Pulse and direction input mode
- Increment/Decrement input mode

 **Caution** The following instructions cannot be used when the CQM1-CPU43-EV1 is set to high-speed counter mode by PC Setup (DM 6611): PLS2 and ACC mode 0.

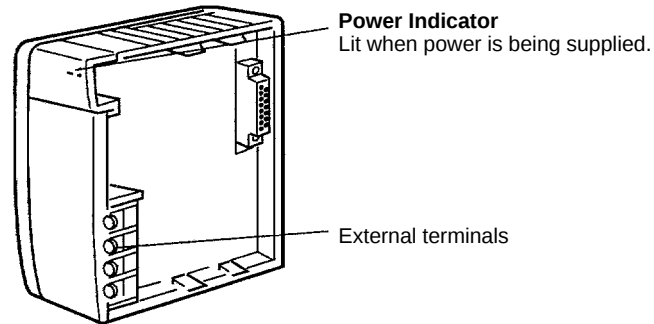

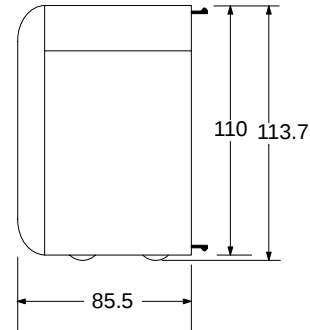

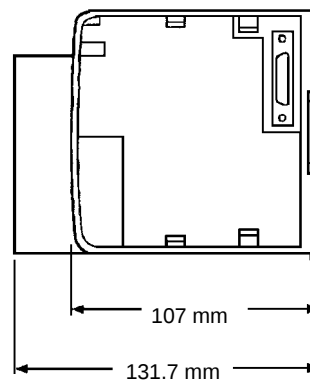

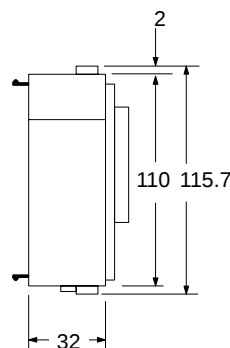

2-5-3 Wiring Precautions for Ground Wires

Wire the grounding wires according to the diagram shown below. The CQM1 PC with the lot number □□Z5 manufactured in December 1995 and later is provided with the LG-GR short-circuit bar and the DIN-track cable.

In order to improve the electromagnetic compatibility (EMC), connect the LG ($\downarrow$ or $\oplus$) terminal to the screw on the end plate using the supplied DIN-track connecting cable.



Note Definition of EMC:

The EMC refers to the capacity of equipment represented in terms of emission, which indicates the degree to which electromagnetic waves produced by equipment do not affect other communications equipment, and also in terms of immunity, which indicates the degree of resistance against electromagnetic disturbance.

2-5-4 I/O Unit Wiring

Note To satisfy the EC directives (low-voltage directives), provide reinforced insulation or double insulation for the DC power supply used with the I/O Unit.

The following information must be considered when connecting electrical devices to I/O Units.

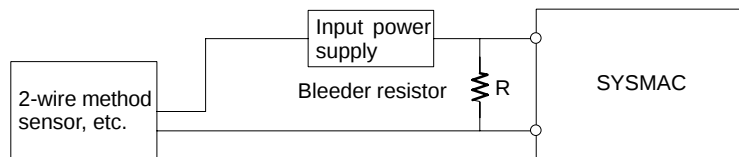
Caution Tighten the terminal screws to a torque of 0.5 to 0.6 N • m.

WARNING Do not apply voltages exceeding the input voltages to Input Units nor voltages exceeding the switching capacity to Output Units. Doing so may result in damage or destruction of the I/O Unit or result in fire.

Leakage Current (24 VDC)

A leakage current can cause false inputs when using 2-wire sensors (proximity switches or photoelectric switches) or limit switches with LEDs on 24 VDC.

If the leakage current exceeds 1.3 mA, insert a bleeder resistor in the circuit to reduce the input impedance, as shown in the following diagram.



$$R = 7.2 / (2.4I - 3) \text{ k}\Omega \text{ max.}$$

I/O Line Noise

Do not run CQM1 I/O lines in the same duct or conduit as multi-conductor cables of other control lines. If power cables carry more than 10 A at 400 V or more than 20 A at 220 V, they must be run parallel to I/O wiring. Leave at least 300 mm between the power cables and the I/O wiring, as shown in the following diagram.



If the I/O wiring and power cables must be placed in the same duct (for example, where they are connected to the equipment), shield them from each other using grounded metal plates. In addition, use shielded cables for the I/O signal lines to improve noise immunity. Also, connect the shielded cables to the GR terminal of the PC.

**Inductive Loads**

When connecting an inductive load to an I/O Unit, connect a diode in parallel with the load. The diode should satisfy the following requirements:

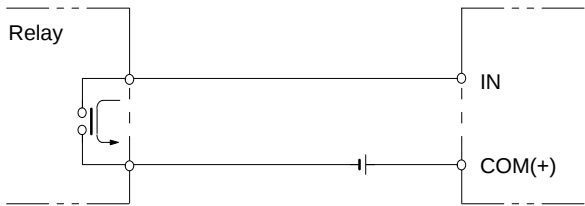
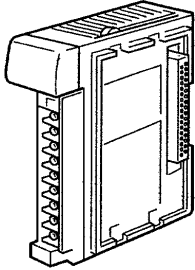
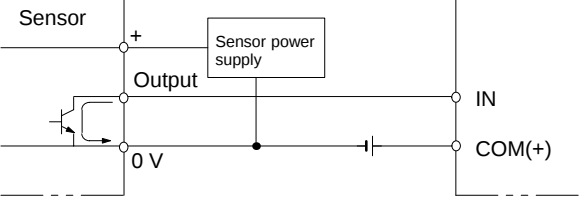
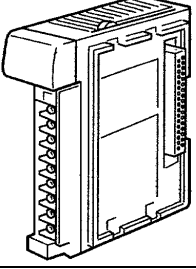
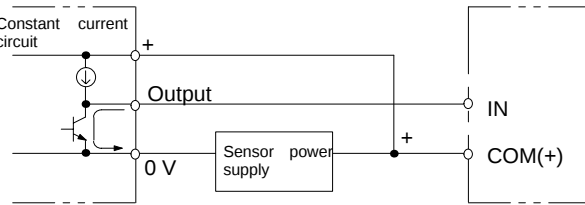
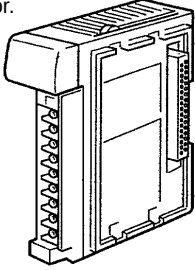
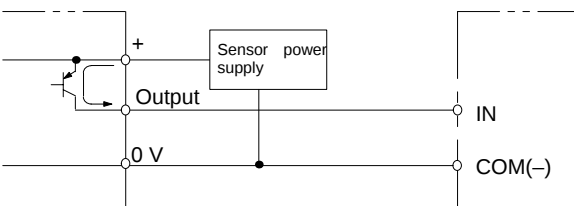
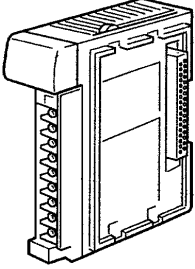
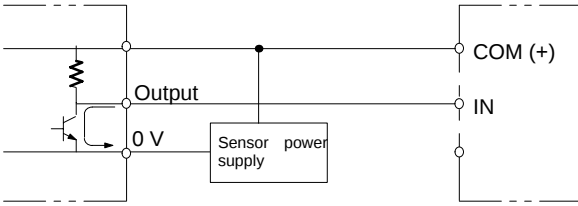
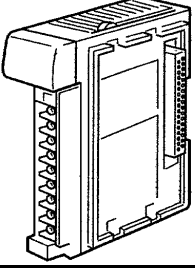

2. The relationship between the PC's ON current and the sensor's control output (load current) must be as follows:

$$I_{OUT} (\text{min.}) \leq I_{ON} \leq I_{OUT} (\text{max.})$$

Where, $I_{ON} = (V_{CC} - V_R - 1.5 \text{ (residual voltage in PC)})/R_{IN}$

If I_{ON} is less than $I_{OUT} (\text{min.})$, connect a bleeder resistor, R. The resistance constant of the bleeder resistor can be calculated as follows:

$$R \leq (V_{CC} - V_R)/(I_{OUT} (\text{min.}) - I_{ON})$$

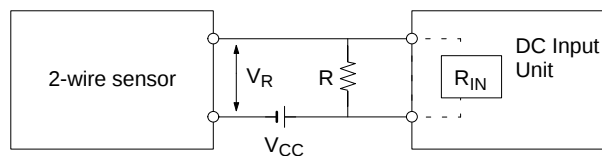
$$\text{Power } W \leq (V_{CC} - V_R)^2/R \times 4 \text{ (tolerance)}$$

3. The relationship between the PC's OFF current and the sensor's residual current must be as follows:

$$I_{OFF} \leq I_{leak}$$

Refer to *Leakage Current (24 VDC)* earlier in this section for details.

The value of I_{OFF} is different for different Units, and is 1.3 mA for all Units for which the OFF current is not listed in the Unit specifications.

2-5-5 Compliance with EC Directives

The following precautions must be abided by when installing CQM1-series PCs to meet EC Directives.

- 1, 2, 3...**
1. CQM1-series PCs are classified as open-structure devices and must be installed inside a control panel.
 2. Use reinforced insulation or double insulation on the DC power supply connected to DC Power Supply Unit and DC I/O Units.
 3. CQM1-series PCs that meet EC Directives meet the common emission standard (EN50081-2) of the EMC Directives as individual products. When assembled into machinery, however, the noise generated by switching relay outputs can fail to meet the standard. When noise is excessive, surge killers must be installed or other measures must be taken outside of the PC. The measures required to meet the standard will vary with the load being driven, wiring, the configuration of the machinery, etc.

The following examples show means of reducing noise. These means will only reduce the amount of noise and will not eliminate noise. They are provided here as examples only.

Requirement

The following conditions can be used to determine if measures to reduce noise are necessary. Refer to the EN50081-2 Standard for details.

- If the loads of the devices into which the PC is built are switched less than 5 times a minute, then no measures need to be taken.
- If the loads of the devices into which the PC is built are switched 5 times or more a minute, then measures need to be taken.

Examples

Inductive Load Surge Suppressor

Connect a surge suppressor or diode in parallel with the load, as shown in the following diagrams, when switching inductive loads.

CR Method (AC or DC)

The reset time will be increased if the load is a relay, solenoid, or similar device. Connect the CR between the load connections for 24-V and 48-V power supply voltages and between the contact connections for 100 to 200-V power supply voltages.

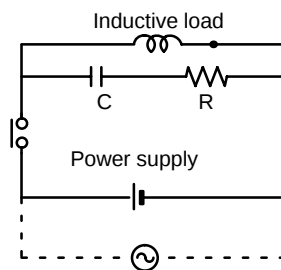
The capacitor and resistors can be based on the following guidelines.

C: 0.5 to 1 μF for each amp of contact current

R: 0.5 to 1 Ω for each volt of contact voltage.

You will need to adjust the above values depending on the characteristics of the load, relay, etc., based on the discharge suppression of the capacitor when the contacts are open and the current control effect of the resistor the next time the circuit is closed.

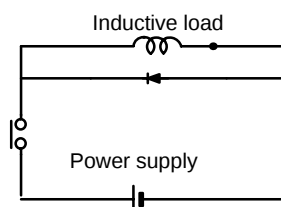
The dielectric strength of the capacitor generally needs to be between 200 and 300 V. Use an AC capacitor (without polarity) in an AC circuit.



Diode Method (DC Only)

The energy stored in the coil is impressed on the coil as a current by the action of the parallel diode and converted to Joule heat by the resistance of the inductive load. Here, the reset time will be increased even more than for the CR method.

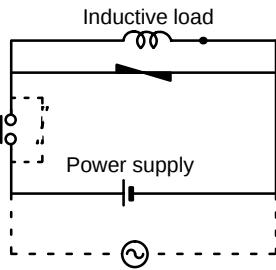
The reverse dielectric strength of the diode must be 10 times the circuit voltage and the forward current must be at least as high as that of the load. If the circuit voltage is low enough, as it is for most electronic circuits, then the reverse dielectric strength of the diode can be as low as 2 to 3 times the circuit voltage.



Varistor (AC or DC)

The method uses the fixed voltage characteristics of a varistor to prevent high voltages from being applied to the contacts. Here, as well, the reset time will be increase somewhat.

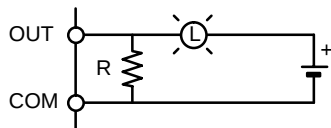
Connect the varistor between the load connections for 24-V and 48-V power supply voltages and between the contact connections for 100 to 200-V power supply voltages.



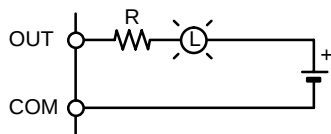
Output Surge Current

When connecting an output device having a high surge current (such as an incandescent lamp), use one of the following circuit configurations to protect the Output Unit.

The following circuit lets the load draw a small current (about one third the rated current) while the output is OFF, significantly reducing the surge current.



The following circuit reduces the surge current by employing a current-limiting resistor.

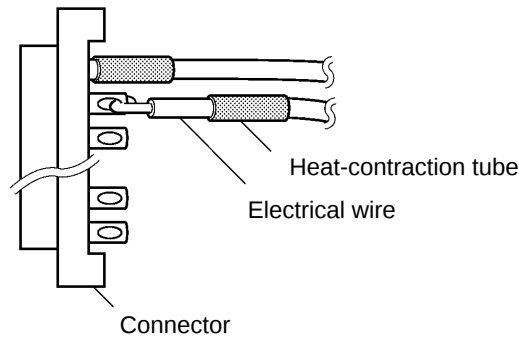

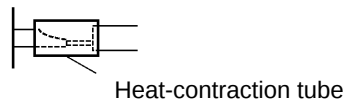

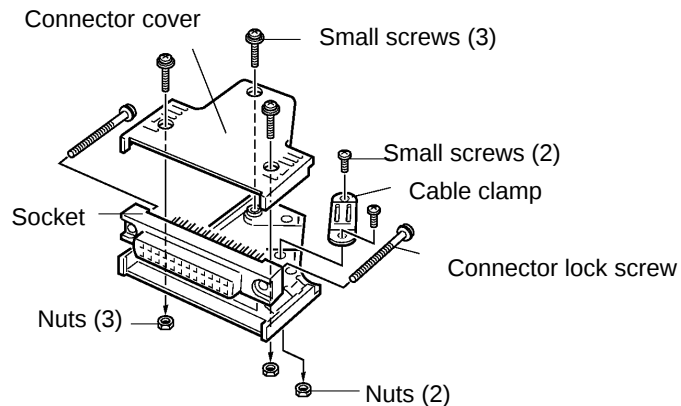
The following illustrations show the procedure for wiring and assembly of solder-type connectors. First pass the electrical wires through heat-contraction tubes and solder them to the socket pins.

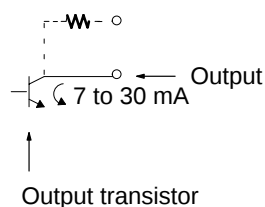
Note In this example, in order to use a 5-V input motor driver with a 24-VDC power supply, the CQM1 internal resistance (1.6 kΩ) is used. Be careful with regard to the drive current at the motor driver.

Caution Be careful when connecting the power supply inputs for the output section. If both 5-VDC and 24-VDC power supplies are provided, and if they are accidentally reversed, the CPU Unit and the power supply may be damaged.

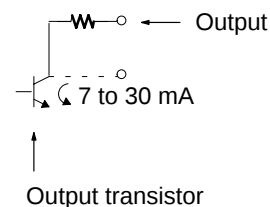
For the pulse output, connect a 7-mA to 30-mA load. (If using a load smaller than 7 mA, install a bypass resistor.)

Two 1.6-kΩ (1/2 W) resistors are built into the internal circuitry (pin numbers 13 and 14) for the pulse output. Use either one of the following outputs, to conform with the power supply, motor driver, and so on, that are used.

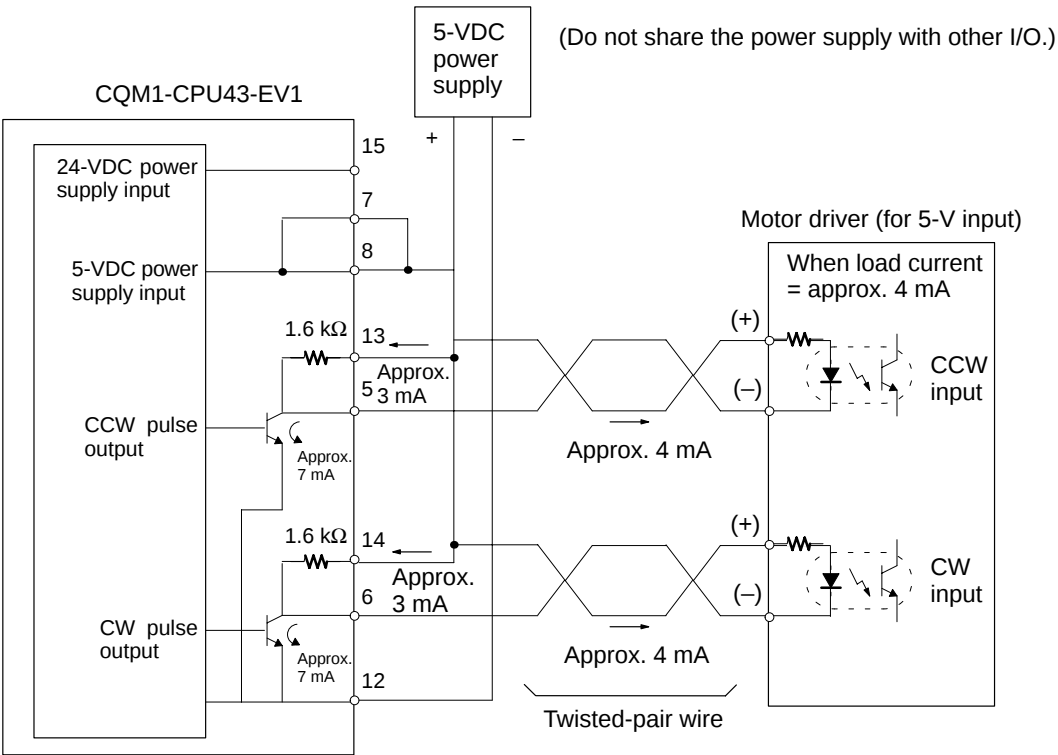

SECTION 3

The LSS, SSS, SYSMAC-CPT, and Programming Consoles

Programming Console connection and operating procedures are provided in this section.

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3-1 LSS Capabilities

The LSS is a complete programming and control package designed for C-series PCs. It provides not only programming capabilities, but also advanced debugging, monitoring, and program/data management. The following tables provide only a brief introduction to the capabilities of the LSS. 3-3 SYSMAC-CPT Precautions

The CQM1 does not contain an I/O table in the CPU Unit and is designed to operate according to the actual Units that configure the PC. I/O bits in the ladder program are displayed for the CQM1 on the SYSMAC-CPT using an I/O table setting display with “I” displayed for input words/bits and “Q” displayed for output words/bits.

The screen displays and printing functions of the SYSMAC-CPT, however, have not yet been upgraded to support the expanded I/O capacity of the CQM1-CPU4□-EV1 CPU Unit. The following restrictions thus apply to the current version of the SYSMAC-CPT.

3-3-1 I/O Table Display

The SYSMAC-CPT will display or print only 12 I/O words, i.e., IR 000 to IR 011. IR 012 to IR 015 will not be displayed for the CQM1-CPU4□-EV1 CPU Unit's I/O

table, even though it has an I/O capacity of 256 pts (16 words). You will not be able to display or print IR 012 to IR 015.

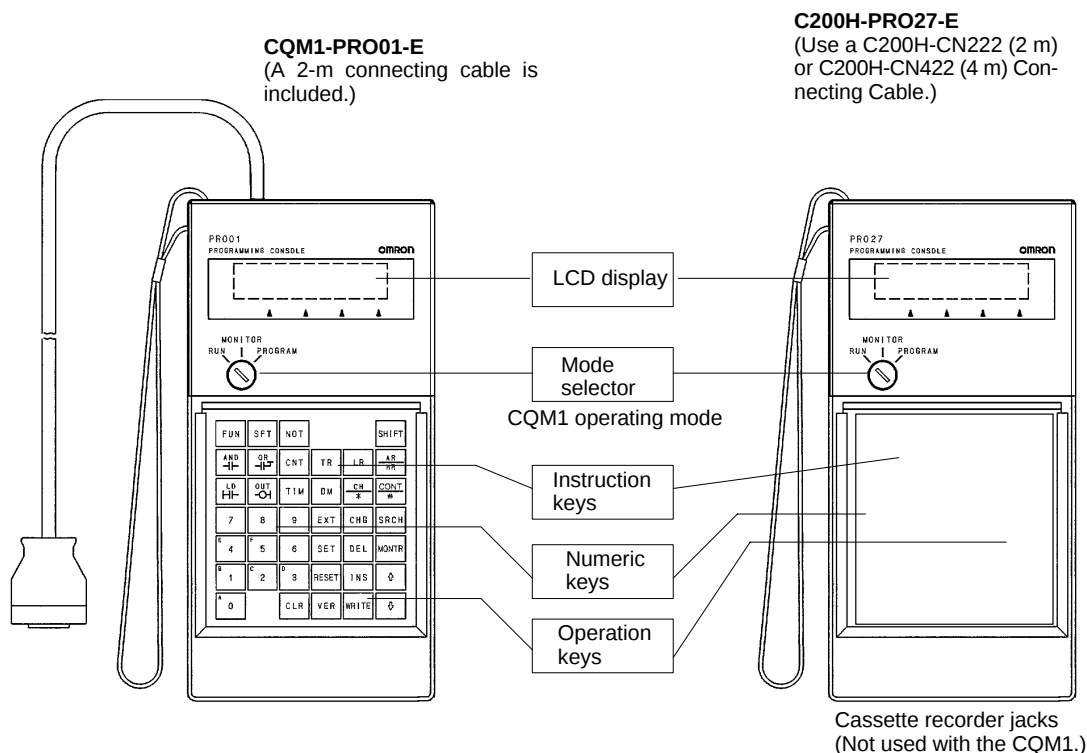
3-3-2 Inputting Ladder Diagrams

Only IR 000 to IR 011 are allowed as I/O words for the CQM1 on the SYSMAC-CPT. You will be able to input IR 012 to IR 015 for the CQM1-CPU4□-EV1 CPU Unit and the program will execute correctly for these bits, but "I" and "Q" will not be displayed to indicate input and output words/bits.

3-4 Compatible Programming Consoles

There are two Programming Consoles that can be used with the CQM1: the CQM1-PRO01-E and the C200H-PRO27-E. The key functions for these Programming Consoles are identical.

Press and hold the Shift Key to input a letter shown in the upper-left corner of the key or the upper function of a key that has two functions. For example, the CQM1-PRO01-E's AR/HR key can specify either the AR or HR Area; press and release the Shift Key and then press the AR/HR Key to specify the AR Area.



Caution When turning on the CQM1, set it to PROGRAM mode using the mode selector as described in 2-1-4 *Operating Modes*. If the PC is set to RUN or MONITOR mode, the program will be executed when it is turned on, possibly causing a PC-controlled system to begin operation.

Note The following three sets of keys are labeled differently on the CQM1-PRO01-E and the C200H-PRO27-E. The operation of the two keys in each pair are identical.

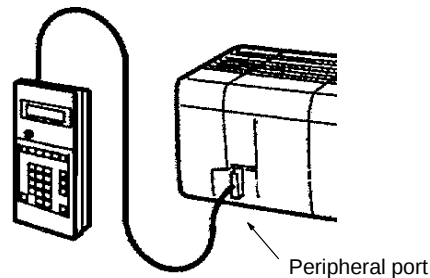

3-5 Preparation for Operation

This section describes how to connect the CQM1 and Programming Console as well as the basic operations required to prepare for programming.

Connecting the Programming Console

Connect the Programming Console's connecting cable to the CQM1's peripheral port, as shown below.



Preparatory Operations

The basic operations required to prepare for programming are listed below.

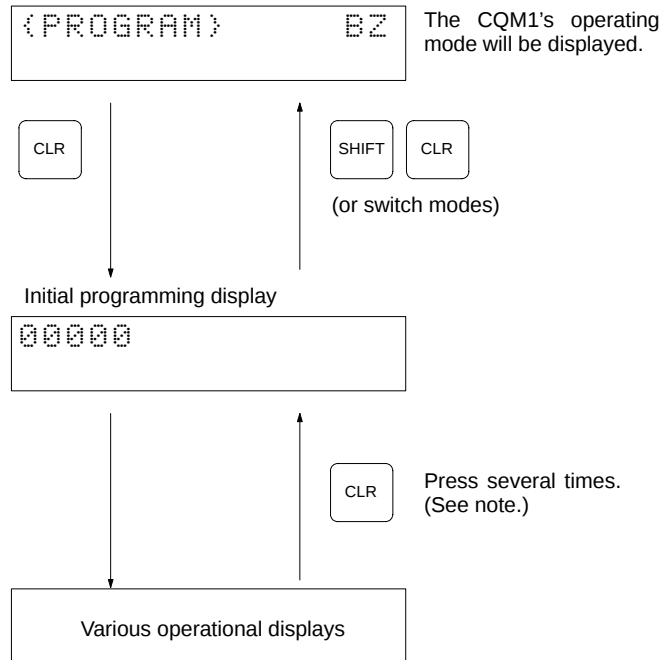
1, 2, 3...

1. Set the Programming Console's mode selector to PROGRAM mode.
2. Enter the password by pressing the CLR and then the MONTR Key.
At this point, the SHIFT and then the 1 key can be pressed to turn on and off the Programming Console's buzzer. Refer to page 84.
3. Clear the CQM1's memory by pressing the CLR, SET, NOT, RESET, and then the MONTR Key. Refer to page 83.
4. Display and clear error messages by pressing the CLR, FUN, and then the MONTR Key. Continue pressing the MONTR Key until all error messages have been cleared. Refer to page 84.
5. Press the CLR Key to bring up the initial programming display (program address 00000).

Changing Displays

The following diagram shows which keys to press in order to change Programming Console displays.

Note When cancelling an operation or beginning operation, press the CLR Key several times to return to the initial display.

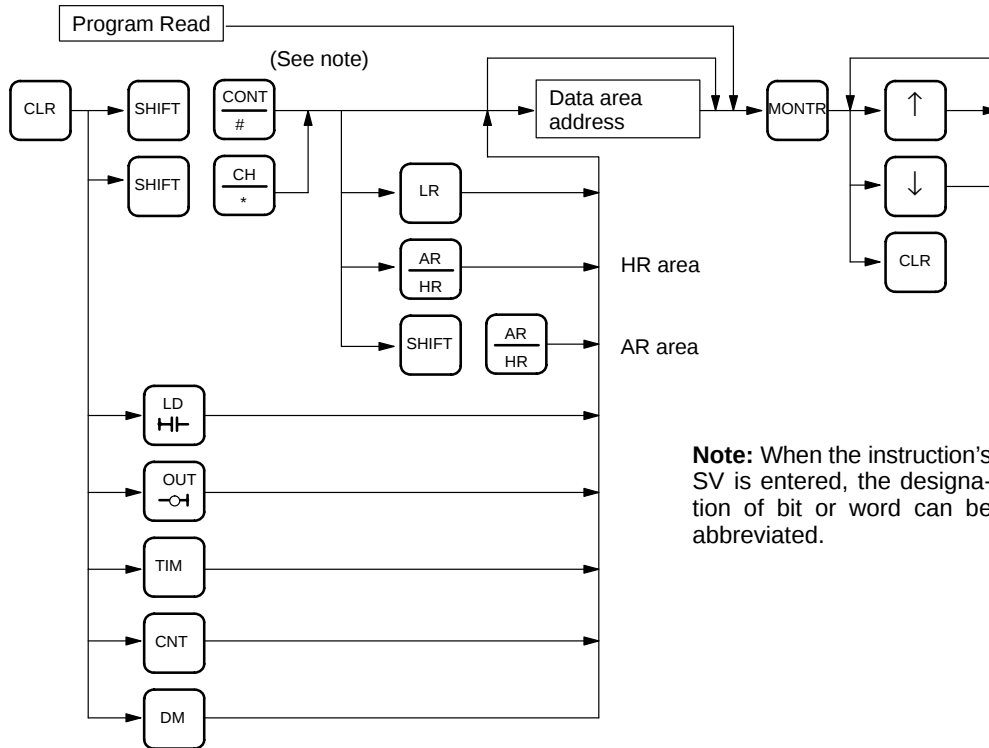

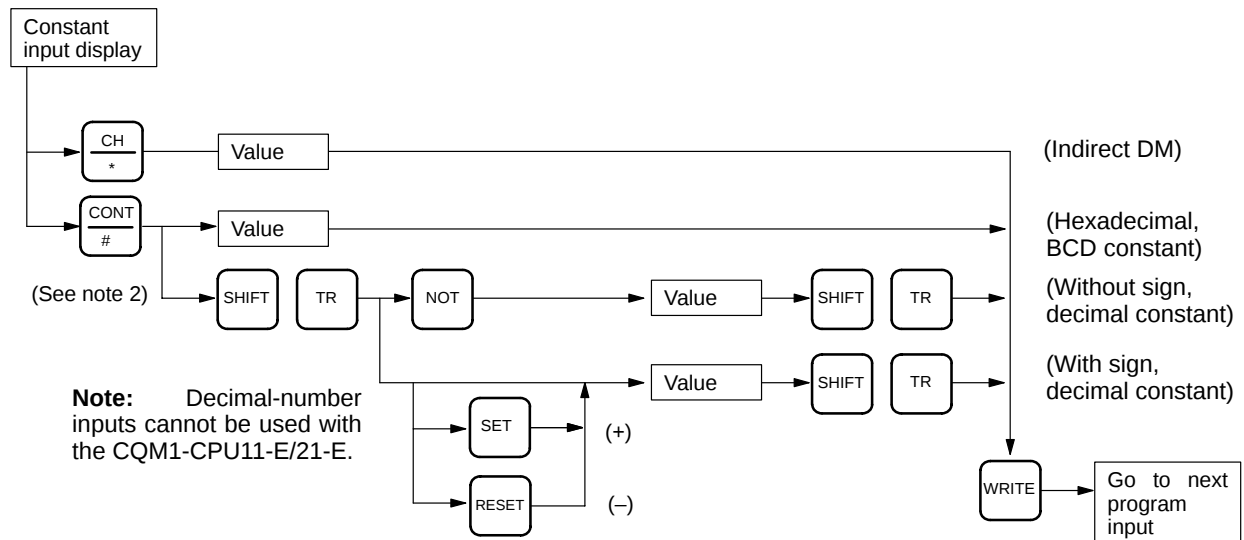
3-6-1 Designating Operands

3-6-2 Clearing Memory

This operation is used to clear all or part of the Program Memory and any data areas that are not read-only, as well as the contents of the Programming Console's memory. This operation is possible in PROGRAM mode only.

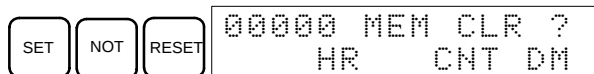

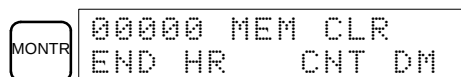

The HR Key is used to specify both the AR and HR Areas, the CNT Key is used to specify the entire timer/counter area, and the DM Key is used to specify the DM Area.

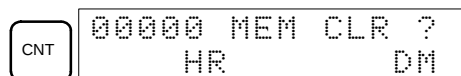
The PC Setup (DM 6600 through DM 6655) will be cleared along with the rest of the DM area if the DM area is specified for clearing. The error log, however, will not be cleared.

It is also possible to retain a portion of the Program Memory from the first memory address to a specified address. After designating the data areas to be retained, specify the first Program Memory address to be cleared. For example, input 030 to leave addresses 000 to 029 untouched, but to clear addresses from 030 to the end of Program Memory.

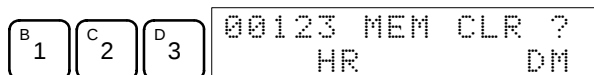

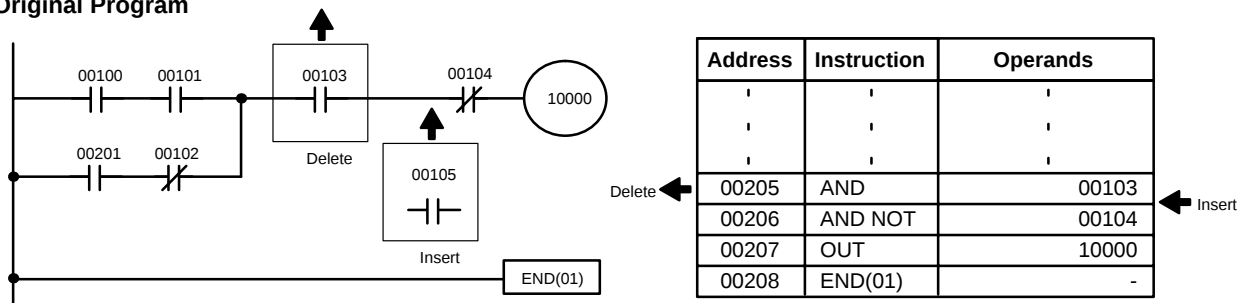

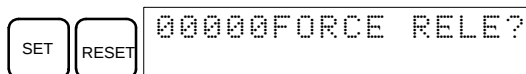
To return the bit to its original status, press the NOT key or perform the Clear Force Set/Reset operation. (Refer to 3-6-26 *Clear Force Set/Reset* for details.) Forced status will also be cleared when the PC's operating mode is changed (unless SR 25211 is ON, in which case forced status will not be cleared when changing from PROGRAM to MONITOR mode) or when operation stops as the result of an error or power interruption.

3-6-26 Clear Force Set/Reset

This operation is used to restore the status of all bits which have been force set or reset. It is possible in MONITOR or PROGRAM mode only.

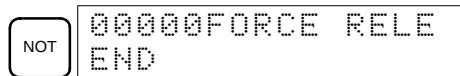

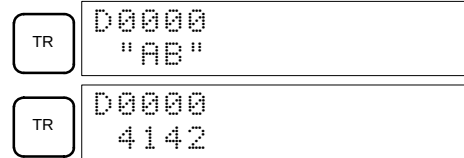

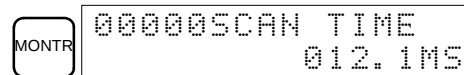


3-6-28 Displaying the Cycle Time

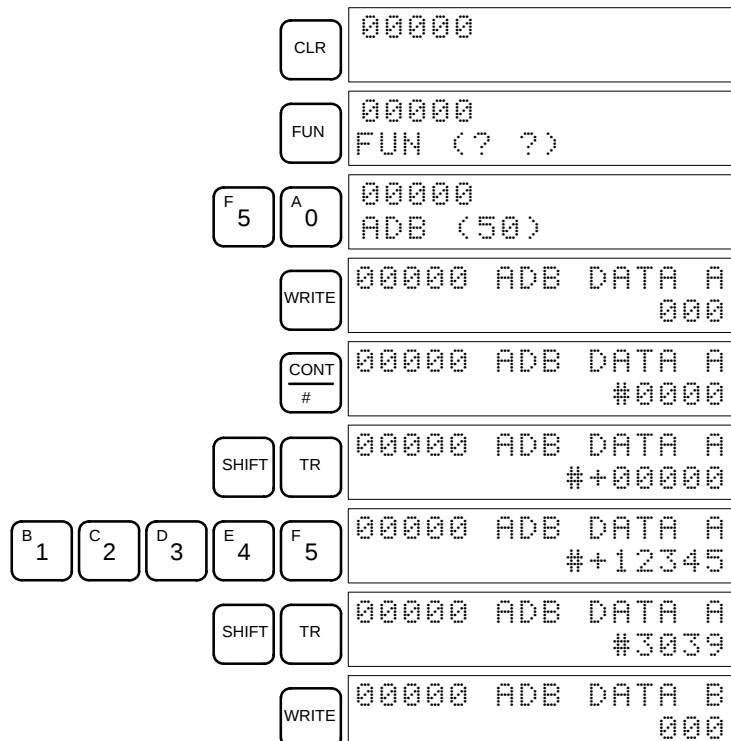
3-6-29 Inputting Signed Binary Data Using Decimal Values

Although calculations for signed binary data use hexadecimal expressions, inputs from the Programming Console or SSS can be done using decimal inputs and mnemonics for the instructions. Examples are shown below for the Programming Console. Refer to the *SSS Operation Manual: C-series PCs* for details on using the SSS.

Input Instructions

Only 16-bit operands can be input for the following instructions: NEG(—), ADB(50), SBB(51), MBS(—), and DBS(—).

SECTION 4

Troubleshooting

This section describes how to diagnose and correct the hardware and software errors that can occur during PC operation.

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4-1 Introduction

PC errors can be divided broadly into the following four categories:

1, 2, 3...

1. Program Input Errors

These errors occur when inputting a program or attempting an operation used to prepare the PC for operation.

2. Programming Errors

These errors will occur when the program is checked using the Program Check operation.

3. User-defined Errors

There are three instructions that the user can use to define his own errors or messages. The instructions will be executed when a particular condition (defined by the user) has occurred during operation.

4. Operating Errors

These errors occur after self-diagnostic program execution has been started.

a) Non-fatal Operating Errors

PC operation and program execution will continue after one or more of these errors have occurred.

b) Fatal Operating Errors

PC operation and program execution will stop and all outputs from the PC will be turned OFF when any of these errors have occurred.

The PC's indicators will indicate when a PC error has occurred and an error message or code will be displayed on the Programming Console or host computer if one is connected. The error code is also contained in SR 25300 to SR 25307.

For the most recent errors, both the type of error and time of occurrence will be recorded in the PC's error log area (DM 6570 to DM 6599). Details are provided in the *CQM1 Programming Manual*.

There are flags and other information provided in the SR and AR areas that can be used in troubleshooting. Details are provided in the *CQM1 Programming Manual*.

Note In addition to the errors described above, communications errors can occur when the PC is part of a Host Link System. Refer to the *CQM1 Programming Manual* for details.



Caution

Expansion instructions (those assigned to function codes 17, 18, 19, 47, 48, 60 to 69, 87, 88, and 89) are not subject to program checks. Program checks also do not cover DM 1024 to DM 6143 for PCs that do not support this part of the DM area (e.g., CQM1-CPU11-E and CQM1-CPU21-E). Data will not be written even if these areas are specified and data read from these areas will always be "0000."

4-2 Programming Console Operation Errors

The following error messages may appear when performing operations on the Programming Console. Correct the error as indicated and continue with the operation. The asterisks in the displays shown below will be replaced with numeric data, normally an address, in the actual display. Refer to the *Ladder Support Software Operation Manual*, *SYSMAC Support Software Operation Manual: C-series PCs*, and *Data Access Console Operation Manual* for errors that may appear when operating the LSS/SSS or a Data Access Console.

Message	Meaning and appropriate response
REPL ROM	An attempt was made to write to write-protected memory. Set the write-protect switch (pin 1 of the CPU Unit's DIP switch) to OFF.
PROG OVER	The instruction at the last address in memory is not NOP(00). Erase all unnecessary instructions at the end of the program.
ADDR OVER	An address was set that is larger than the highest memory address in Program Memory. Input a smaller address.
SETDATA ERR	FALS 00 has been input, and "00" cannot be input. Reinput the data.
I/O NO. ERR	A data area address has been designated that exceeds the limit of the data area, e.g., an address is too large. Confirm the requirements for the instruction and re-enter the address.

4-3 Programming Errors

These errors in program syntax will be detected when the program is checked using the Program Check operation.

Three levels of program checking are available. The desired level must be designated to indicate the type of errors that are to be detected. The following table provides the error types, displays, and explanations of all syntax errors. Check level 0 checks for type A, B, and C errors; check level 1, for type A and B errors; and check level 2, for type A errors only.

Level A Errors

Message	Meaning and appropriate response
?????	The program has been damaged, creating a non-existent function code. Re-enter the program.
CIRCUIT ERR	The number of logic blocks and logic block instructions does not agree, i.e., either LD or LD NOT has been used to start a logic block whose execution condition has not been used by another instruction, or a logic block instruction has been used that does not have the required number of logic blocks. Check your program.
OPERAND ERR	A constant entered for the instruction is not within defined values. Change the constant so that it lies within the proper range.
NO END INSTR	There is no END(01) in the program. Write END(01) at the final address in the program.
LOCN ERR	An instruction is in the wrong place in the program. Check instruction requirements and correct the program.
JME UNDEFD	A JME(04) instruction is missing for a JMP(05) instruction. Correct the jump number or insert the proper JME(04) instruction.
DUPL	The same jump number or subroutine number has been used twice. Correct the program so that the same number is only used once for each.
SBN UNDEFD	The SBS(91) instruction has been programmed for a subroutine number that does not exist. Correct the subroutine number or program the required subroutine.
STEP ERR	STEP(08) with a section number and STEP(08) without a section number have been used incorrectly. Check STEP(08) programming requirements and correct the program.

Level B Errors

Message	Meaning and appropriate response
IL-ILC ERR	IL(02) and ILC(03) are not used in pairs. Correct the program so that each IL(02) has a unique ILC(03). Although this error message will appear if more than one IL(02) is used with the same ILC(03), the program will be executed as written. Make sure your program is written as desired before proceeding.
JMP-JME ERR	JMP(04) 00 and JME(05) 00 are not used in pairs. Although this error message will appear if more than one JMP(04) 00 is used with the same JME(05) 00, the program will be executed as written. Make sure your program is written as desired before proceeding.
SBN-RET ERR	If the displayed address is that of SBN(92), two different subroutines have been defined with the same subroutine number. Change one of the subroutine numbers or delete one of the subroutines. If the displayed address is that of RET(93), RET(93) has not been used properly. Check requirements for RET(93) and correct the program.

Level C Errors

Message	Meaning and appropriate response
COIL DUPL	The same bit is being controlled (i.e., turned ON and/or OFF) by more than one instruction (e.g., OUT, OUT NOT, DIFU(13), DIFD(14), KEEP(11), SFT(10)). Although this is allowed for certain instructions, check instruction requirements to confirm that the program is correct or rewrite the program so that each bit is controlled by only one instruction.
JMP UNDEFD	JME(05) has been used with no JMP(04) with the same jump number. Add a JMP(04) with the same number or delete the JME(05) that is not being used.
SBS UNDEFD	A subroutine exists that is not called by SBS(91). Program a subroutine call in the proper place, or delete the subroutine if it is not required.

4-4 User-defined Errors

There are three instructions that the user can use to define his own errors or messages. These instructions are used to send messages to the Programming Console connected to the PC, cause a non-fatal or a fatal error.

FAILURE ALARM – FAL(06)

FAL(06) is an instruction that causes a non-fatal error. The following will occur when an FAL(06) instruction is executed:

- 1, 2, 3... 1. The ERR/ALM indicator on the CPU Unit will flash. PC operation will continue.
2. The instruction's 2-digit BCD FAL number (01 to 99) will be written to SR 25300 to SR 25307.
3. The FAL number and time of occurrence will be recorded in the PC's error log area if a Memory Cassette with a clock (RTC) is used.

The FAL numbers can be set arbitrarily to indicate particular conditions. The same number cannot be used as both an FAL number and an FALS number.

To clear an FAL error, correct the cause of the error, execute FAL 00, and then clear the error using the Programming Console.

SEVERE FAILURE ALARM – FALS(07)

FALS(07) is an instruction that causes a fatal error. The following will occur when an FALS(07) instruction is executed:

- 1, 2, 3... 1. Program execution will be stopped and outputs will be turned OFF.
2. The ERR/ALM indicator on the CPU Unit will be lit.
3. The instruction's 2-digit BCD FALS number (01 to 99) will be written to SR 25300 to SR 25307.
4. The FALS number and time of occurrence will be recorded in the PC's error log area if a Memory Cassette with a clock (RTC) is used.

The FALS numbers can be set arbitrarily to indicate particular conditions. The same number cannot be used as both an FAL number and an FALS number.

To clear an FALS error, switch the PC to PROGRAM Mode, correct the cause of the error, and then clear the error using the Programming Console.

MESSAGE – MSG(46)

MSG(46) is used to display a message on the Programming Console. The message, which can be up to 16 characters long, is displayed when the instruction's execution condition is ON.

FAILURE POINT DETECT – FPD

FPD can be used to generate a non-fatal error (FAL) and to display any message at a peripheral device.

4-5 Operating Errors

There are two kinds of operating errors, non-fatal and fatal. PC operation will continue after a non-fatal error occurs, but operation will be stopped if a fatal error occurs.

4-5-1 Non-fatal Errors

PC operation and program execution will continue after one or more of these errors have occurred. Although PC operation will continue, the cause of the error should be corrected and the error cleared as soon as possible.

When one of these errors occurs, the POWER and RUN indicators will remain lit and the ERR/ALM indicator will flash.

Message	FAL No.	Meaning and appropriate response
SYS FAIL FAL** (see note)	01 to 99	An FAL(06) instruction has been executed in the program. Check the FAL number to determine conditions that would cause execution, correct the cause, and clear the error.
	9D	An error has occurred during data transmission between the CPU Unit and Memory Cassette. Check the status of flags AR 1412 to AR 1415, and correct as directed. AR 1412 ON: Switch to PROGRAM Mode, clear the error, and transfer again. AR 1413 ON: The transfer destination is write-protected. If the PC is the destination, turn off the power to the PC, be sure that pin 1 of the CPU Unit's DIP switch is OFF, clear the error, and transfer again. If an EEPROM Memory Cassette is the destination, check whether the power supply is on, clear the error, and transfer again. If an EPROM Memory Cassette is the destination, change to a writeable Memory Cassette. AR 1414 ON: The destination has insufficient capacity. Check the source's program size in AR 15 and consider using a different CPU Unit or Memory Cassette. AR 1415 ON: There is no program in the Memory Cassette or the program contains errors. Check the Memory Cassette.
	9C	An error has occurred in the pulse I/O function, in the absolute-type encoder interface function, or in the AD/DA board function. Check the contents of AR 0408 to AR 0415 (two digits BCD), and correct as directed. (This error code applies only to CQM1-CPU43-EV1 and CQM1-CPU44-EV1 CPU Units.) 01, 02: An error has occurred in the hardware. Turn the power off, and then power up again. If the error persists, replace the CPU Unit. 03: The PC Setup (DM 6611, DM 6612, DM 6643, DM 6644) settings are incorrect. Correct the settings. 04: CQM1 operation was interrupted during pulse output. Check to see whether the unit receiving the pulse output was affected.

Message	FAL No.	Meaning and appropriate response
SYS FAIL FAL** (see note)	9B	An error has been detected in the PC Setup. Check flags AR 2400 to AR 2402, and correct as directed. AR 2400 ON: An incorrect setting was detected in the PC Setup (DM 6600 to DM 6614) when power was turned on. Correct the settings in PROGRAM Mode and turn on the power again. AR 2401 ON: An incorrect setting was detected in the PC Setup (DM 6615 to DM 6644) when switching to RUN Mode. Correct the settings in PROGRAM Mode and switch to RUN Mode again. AR 2402 ON: An incorrect setting was detected in the PC Setup (DM 6645 to DM 6655) during operation. Correct the settings and clear the error.
SCAN TIME OVER	F8	Watchdog timer has exceeded 100 ms. (SR 25309 will be ON.) This indicates that the program cycle time is longer than recommended. Reduce cycle time if possible.
BATT LOW	F7	Backup battery is missing or its voltage has dropped. (SR 25308 will be ON.) Check the battery and replace if necessary. Check the PC Setup (DM 6655) to see whether a low battery will be detected.

Note ** is 01 to 99, 9D, 9C, or 9B.

Communication Errors

If an error occurs in communications through the peripheral port or RS-232C port the corresponding indicator (COM1 or COM2) will stop flashing. Check the connecting cables as well as the programs in the PC and host computer.

Reset the communications ports with the Port Reset Bits, SR 25208 and SR 25209.

Output Inhibit

When the OUT INH indicator is lit, the Output Inhibit Bit (SR 25215) is ON and all outputs from the CPU Unit will be turned off. If it is not necessary to have all outputs off, turn OFF SR 25215.

4-5-2 Fatal Errors

PC operation and program execution will stop and all outputs from the PC will be turned OFF when any of these errors have occurred.

All CPU Unit indicators will be OFF for the power interruption error. For all other fatal operating errors, the POWER and ERR/ALM indicators will be lit. The RUN indicator will be OFF.

Message	FALS No.	Meaning and appropriate response
Power interruption (no message)	None	Power has been interrupted for at least 10 ms. Check power supply voltage and power lines. Try to power-up again.
MEMORY ERR	F1	AR 1611 ON: A checksum error has occurred in the PC Setup (DM 6600 to DM 6655). Initialize all of the PC Setup and reinput. AR 1612 ON: A checksum error has occurred in the program, indicating an incorrect instruction. Check the program and correct any errors detected. AR 1613 ON: A checksum error has occurred in an expansion instruction's data. Initialize all of the expansion instruction settings and reinput. AR 1614 ON: Memory Cassette was installed or removed with the power on. Turn the power off, install the Memory Cassette, and turn the power on again. AR 1615 ON: The Memory Cassette contents could not be read at start-up. Check flags AR 1412 to AR 1415 to determine the problem, correct it, and turn on the power again.
NO END INST	F0	END(01) is not written anywhere in program. Write END(01) at the final address of the program.
I/O BUS ERR	C0	An error has occurred during data transfer between the CPU Unit and an I/O Unit. Determine the location of the problem using flags AR 2408 to AR 2415, turn the power off, check for loose I/O Units or end covers, and turn on the power again.
I/O UNIT OVER	E1	The number of I/O words on the installed I/O Units exceeds the maximum. Turn off the power, rearrange the system to reduce the number of I/O words, and turn on the power again.

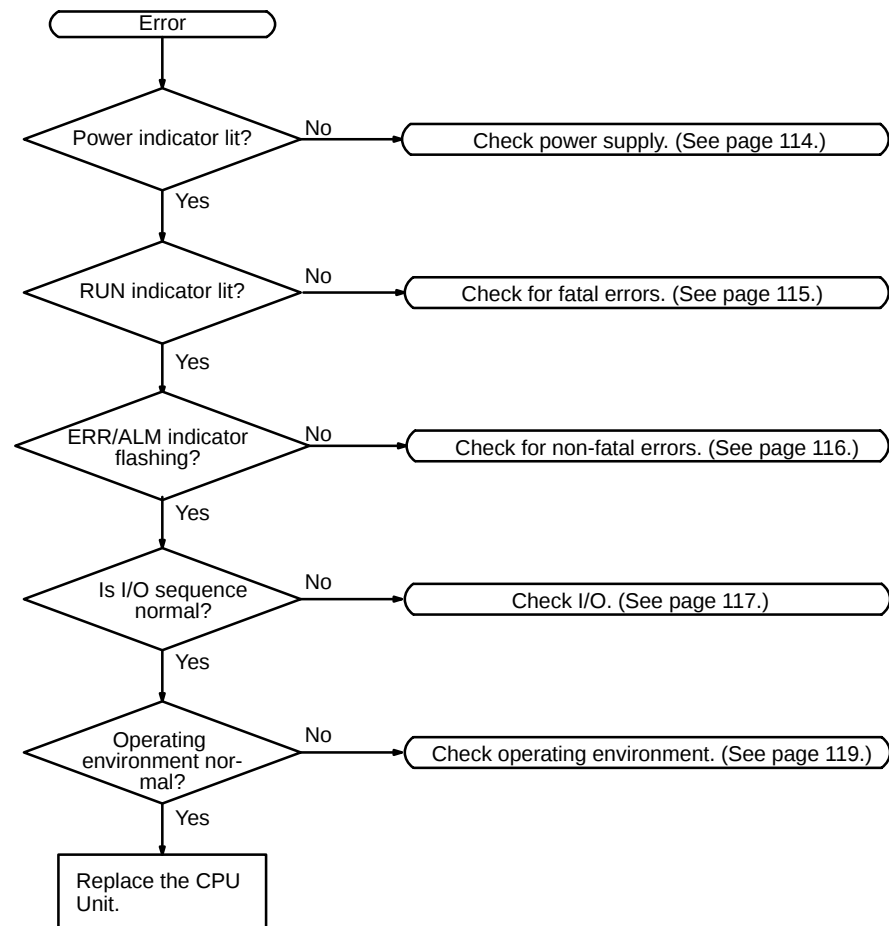

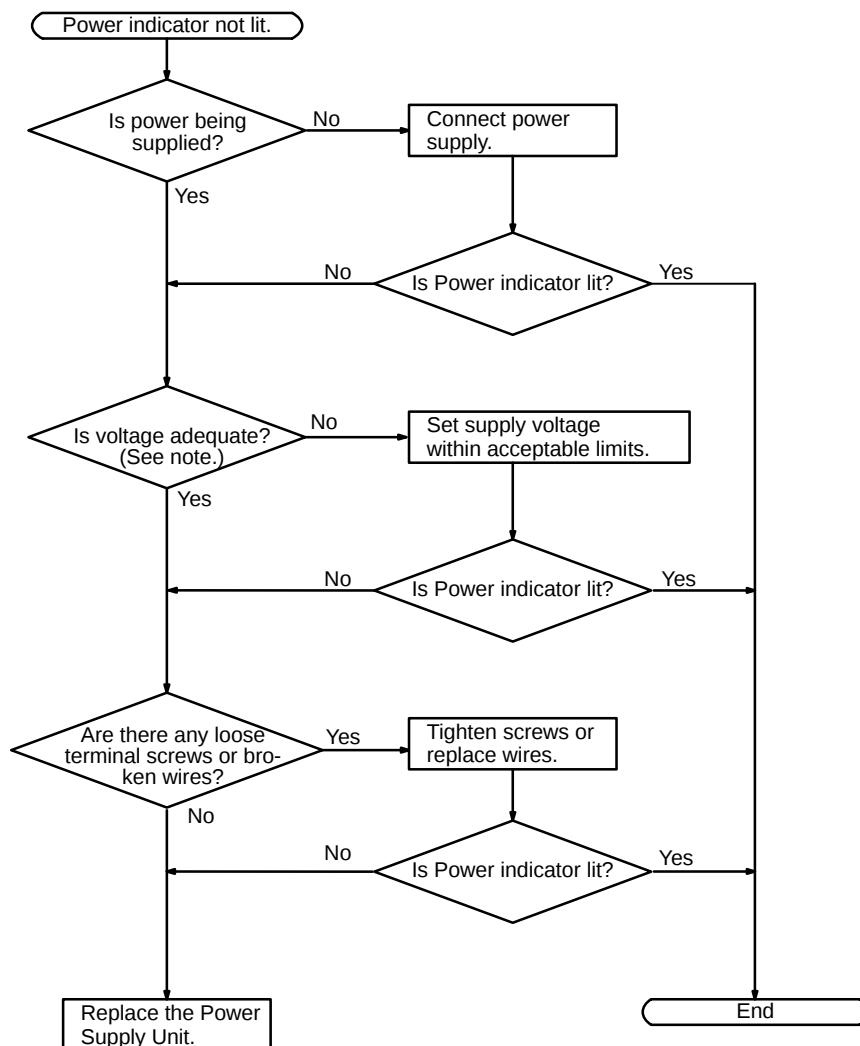

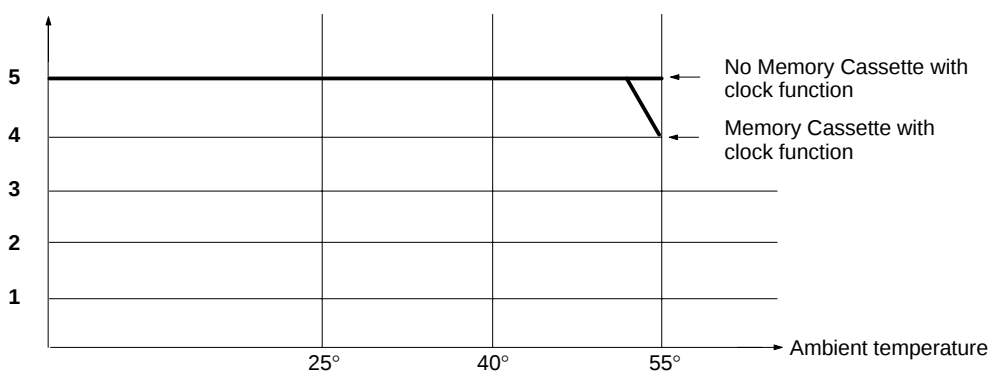
Battery Service Life

The built-in battery is used for retaining the status of the HR and DM areas, the user's program, and other specified status while power is not being supplied to the CQM1. The total number of hours that the battery can provide backup power will vary as shown below, depending on the ambient temperature and whether or not a Memory Cassette with a clock is installed.

Appendix C

SYSMAC-CPT Precautions

The SYSMAC-CPT Support Software (model number WS01-CPTB1-E) can be used for the CQM1. This appendix lists precautions when using the SYSMAC-CPT.

When displaying or printing ladder programs on the SYSMAC-CPT, symbols are displayed for I/O bits in the program according to the I/O table registered in the SYSMAC-CPT. “I” is displayed for input words/bits and “Q” is displayed for output words/bits. The SYSMAC-CPT, however, has not yet been upgraded to support the expanded I/O capacity of the CQM1-CPU4□-EV1 CPU Unit (words IR 012 to IR 015). The following restrictions thus apply when using the SYSMAC-CPT.

Note The CPU Unit of the CQM1 does not contain an I/O table. Therefore, even if the I/O table on the Support Software is incorrectly set, the system will still operate according to the Units that are actually connected.

I/O Table Displays

The SYSMAC-CPT I/O table will display or print only 12 I/O words, even for the CQM1-CPU4□-EV1, which has an I/O capacity of 256 pts (16 words).

Glossary

*DM	Indirectly addressed DM area. See <i>indirect address</i> and <i>DM area</i> .
1:1 link	A link created between two PCs to create <i>common data</i> in their LR areas.
ACP	See <i>add count input</i> .
add count input	An input signal used to increment a counter when the signal changes from OFF to ON.
address	A number used to identify the location of data or programming instructions in memory.
AND	A logic operation whereby the result is true if and only if both premises are true. In ladder-diagram programming the premises are usually ON/OFF states of bits or the logical combination of such states called execution conditions.
area	See <i>data area</i> and <i>memory area</i> .
area prefix	A one or two letter prefix used to identify a memory area in the PC. All memory areas except the IR and SR areas require prefixes to identify addresses in them.
arithmetic shift	A shift operation wherein the carry flag is included in the shift.
ASCII	Short for American Standard Code for Information Interchange. ASCII is used to code characters for output to printers and other external devices.
AR Area	A PC data area allocated to flags and control bits.
AUTOEXEC.BAT	An MS DOS file containing commands automatically executed at startup.
back-up	A copy made of existing data to ensure that the data will not be lost even if the original data is corrupted or erased.
basic instruction	A fundamental instruction used in a ladder diagram. See <i>advanced instruction</i> .
baud rate	The data transmission speed between two devices in a system measured in bits per second.
BCD	See <i>binary-coded decimal</i> .
BCD calculation	An arithmetic calculation that uses numbers expressed in binary-coded decimal.
binary	A number system where all numbers are expressed in base 2, i.e., numbers are written using only 0's and 1's. Each group of four binary bits is equivalent to one hexadecimal digit. Binary data in memory is thus often expressed in hexadecimal for convenience.
binary calculation	An arithmetic calculation that uses numbers expressed in binary.
binary-coded decimal	A system used to represent numbers so that every four binary bits is numerically equivalent to one decimal digit.
bit	The smallest piece of information that can be represented on a computer. A bit has the value of either zero or one, corresponding to the electrical signals ON and OFF. A bit represents one binary digit. Some bits at particular addresses are allocated to special purposes, such as holding the status of input from external devices, while other bits are available for general use in programming.
bit address	The location in memory where a bit of data is stored. A bit address specifies the data area and word that is being addressed as well as the number of the bit within the word.

bit designator	An operand that is used to designate the bit or bits of a word to be used by an instruction.
bit number	A number that indicates the location of a bit within a word. Bit 00 is the rightmost (least-significant) bit; bit 15 is the leftmost (most-significant) bit.
bit-control instruction	An instruction that is used to control the status of an individual bit as opposed to the status of an entire word.
block	See <i>logic block</i> and <i>instruction block</i> .
building-block PC	A PC that is constructed from individual components, or “building blocks.” With building-block PCs, there is no one Unit that is independently identifiable as a PC. The PC is rather a functional assembly of Units.
bus	A communications path used to pass data between any of the Units connected to it.
bus bar	The line leading down the left and sometimes right side of a ladder diagram. Instruction execution proceeds down the bus bar, which is the starting point for all instruction lines.
byte	A unit of data equivalent to 8 bits, i.e., half a word.
call	A process by which instruction execution shifts from the main program to a subroutine. The subroutine may be called by an instruction or by an interrupt.
Carry Flag	A flag that is used with arithmetic operations to hold a carry from an addition or multiplication operation, or to indicate that the result is negative in a subtraction operation. The carry flag is also used with certain types of shift operations.
central processing unit	A device that is capable of storing programs and data, and executing the instructions contained in the programs. In a PC System, the central processing unit executes the program, processes I/O signals, communicates with external devices, etc.
CH	See <i>word</i> .
channel	See <i>word</i> .
character code	A numeric (usually binary) code used to represent an alphanumeric character.
checksum	A sum transmitted with a data pack in communications. The checksum can be recalculated from the received data to confirm that the data in the transmission has not been corrupted.
clock pulse	A pulse available at specific bits in memory for use in timing operations. Various clock pulses are available with different pulse widths, and therefore different frequencies.
clock pulse bit	A bit in memory that supplies a pulse that can be used to time operations. Various clock pulse bits are available with different pulse widths, and therefore different frequencies.
common data	Data that is stored in a memory of a PC and which is shared by other PCs in the same the same system. Each PC has a specified section(s) of the area allocated to it. Each PC writes to the section(s) allocated to it and reads the sections allocated to the other PCs with which it shares the common data.
communications cable	Cable used to transfer data between components of a control system and conforming to the RS-232C or RS-422 standards.
comparison instruction	An instruction used to compare data at different locations in memory to determine the relationship between the data.

Completion Flag	A flag used with a timer or counter that turns ON when the timer has timed out or the counter has reached its set value.
condition	A symbol placed on an instruction line to indicate an instruction that controls the execution condition for the terminal instruction. Each condition is assigned a bit in memory that determines its status. The status of the bit assigned to each condition determines the next execution condition. Conditions correspond to LOAD, LOAD NOT, AND, AND NOT, OR, or OR NOT instructions.
CONFIG.SYS	An MS DOS file containing environment settings for a personal computer.
constant	An input for an operand in which the actual numeric value is specified. Constants can be input for certain operands in place of memory area addresses. Some operands must be input as constants.
control bit	A bit in a memory area that is set either through the program or via a Programming Device to achieve a specific purpose, e.g., a Restart Bit is turned ON and OFF to restart a Unit.
control data	An operand that specifies how an instruction is to be executed. The control data may specify the part of a word is to be used as the operand, it may specify the destination for a data transfer instructions, it may specify the size of a data table used in an instruction, etc.
control signal	A signal sent from the PC to effect the operation of the controlled system.
Control System	All of the hardware and software components used to control other devices. A Control System includes the PC System, the PC programs, and all I/O devices that are used to control or obtain feedback from the controlled system.
controlled system	The devices that are being controlled by a PC System.
count pulse	The signal counted by a counter.
counter	A dedicated group of digits or words in memory used to count the number of times a specific process has occurred, or a location in memory accessed through a TIM/CNT bit and used to count the number of times the status of a bit or an execution condition has changed from OFF to ON.
CPU Unit	See <i>central processing unit</i> .
CTS	An acronym for clear-to-send, a signal used in communications between electronic devices to indicate that the receiver is ready to accept incoming data.
CY	See <i>Carry Flag</i> .
cycle	One unit of processing performed by the CPU Unit, including ladder program execution, peripheral servicing, I/O refreshing, etc.
cycle time	The time required to complete one cycle of CPU Unit processing.
cyclic interrupt	See <i>scheduled interrupt</i> .
data area	An area in the PC's memory that is designed to hold a specific type of data.
data area boundary	The highest address available within a data area. When designating an operand that requires multiple words, it is necessary to ensure that the highest address in the data area is not exceeded.
data disk	A floppy disk used to save user programs, DM area contents, comments, and other user data.
data length	In communications, the number of bits that is to be treated as one unit in data transmissions.

data link	An automatic data transmission operation that allows PCs or Units within PC to pass data back and forth via common data areas.
data link area	A common data area established through a data link.
data movement instruction	An instruction used to move data from one location in memory to another. The data in the original memory location is left unchanged.
data sharing	The process in which common data areas or common data words are created between two or more PCs.
data trace	A process in which changes in the contents of specific memory locations are recorded during program execution.
data transfer	Moving data from one memory location to another, either within the same device or between different devices connected via a communications line or network.
debug	A process by which a draft program is corrected until it operates as intended. Debugging includes both the removal of syntax errors, as well as the fine-tuning of timing and coordination of control operations.
decimal	A number system where numbers are expressed to the base 10. In a PC all data is ultimately stored in binary form, four binary bits are often used to represent one decimal digit, via a system called binary-coded decimal.
decrement	Decreasing a numeric value, usually by 1.
default	A value automatically set by the PC when the user does not specifically set another value. Many devices will assume such default conditions upon the application of power.
definer	A number used as an operand for an instruction but that serves to define the instruction itself, rather than the data on which the instruction is to operate. Definers include jump numbers, subroutine numbers, etc.
destination	The location where an instruction places the data on which it is operating, as opposed to the location from which data is taken for use in the instruction. The location from which data is taken is called the source.
differentiated instruction	An instruction that is executed only once each time its execution condition goes from OFF to ON. Non-differentiated instructions are executed for each scan as long as the execution condition stays ON.
differentiation instruction	An instruction used to ensure that the operand bit is never turned ON for more than one scan after the execution condition goes either from OFF to ON for a Differentiate Up instruction or from ON to OFF for a Differentiate Down instruction.
digit	A unit of storage in memory that consists of four bits.
digit designator	An operand that is used to designate the digit or digits of a word to be used by an instruction.
DIN track	A rail designed to fit into grooves on various devices to allow the devices to be quickly and easily mounted to it.
DIP switch	Dual in-line package switch, an array of pins in a signal package that is mounted to a circuit board and is used to set operating parameters.
direct output	A method in which program execution results are output immediately to eliminate the affects of the cycle time.
distributed control	A automation concept in which control of each portion of an automated system is located near the devices actually being controlled, i.e., control is decentralized

	and 'distributed' over the system. Distributed control is a concept basic to PC Systems.
DM area	A data area used to hold only word data. Words in the DM area cannot be accessed bit by bit.
DM word	A word in the DM area.
downloading	The process of transferring a program or data from a higher-level or host computer to a lower-level or slave computer. If a Programming Device is involved, the Programming Device is considered the host computer.
EEPROM	Electrically erasable programmable read-only memory; a type of ROM in which stored data can be erased and reprogrammed. This is accomplished using a special control lead connected to the EEPROM chip and can be done without having to remove the EEPROM chip from the device in which it is mounted.
electrical noise	Random variations of one or more electrical characteristics such as voltage, current, and data, which might interfere with the normal operation of a device.
EPROM	Erasable programmable read-only memory; a type of ROM in which stored data can be erased, by ultraviolet light or other means, and reprogrammed.
error code	A numeric code generated to indicate that an error exists, and something about the nature of the error. Some error codes are generated by the system; others are defined in the program by the operator.
Error Log Area	An area used to store records indicating the time and nature of errors that have occurred in the system.
even parity	A communication setting that adjusts the number of ON bits so that it is always even. See <i>parity</i> .
event processing	Processing that is performed in response to an event, e.g., an interrupt signal.
exclusive NOR	A logic operation whereby the result is true if both of the premises are true or both of the premises are false. In ladder-diagram programming, the premises are usually the ON/OFF states of bits, or the logical combination of such states, called execution conditions.
exclusive OR	A logic operation whereby the result is true if one, and only one, of the premises is true. In ladder-diagram programming the premises are usually the ON/OFF states of bits, or the logical combination of such states, called execution conditions.
execution condition	The ON or OFF status under which an instruction is executed. The execution condition is determined by the logical combination of conditions on the same instruction line and up to the instruction currently being executed.
execution cycle	The cycle used to execute all processes required by the CPU Unit, including program execution, I/O refreshing, peripheral servicing, etc.
execution time	The time required for the CPU Unit to execute either an individual instruction or an entire program.
extended counter	A counter created in a program by using two or more count instructions in succession. Such a counter is capable of counting higher than any of the standard counters provided by the individual instructions.
extended timer	A timer created in a program by using two or more timers in succession. Such a timer is capable of timing longer than any of the standard timers provided by the individual instructions.

FA	Factory automation.
factory computer	A general-purpose computer, usually quite similar to a business computer, that is used in automated factory control.
FAL error	An error generated from the user program by execution of an FAL(06) instruction.
FALS error	An error generated from the user program by execution of an FALS(07) instruction or an error generated by the system.
fatal error	An error that stops PC operation and requires correction before operation can continue.
FCS	See <i>frame checksum</i> .
flag	A dedicated bit in memory that is set by the system to indicate some type of operating status. Some flags, such as the carry flag, can also be set by the operator or via the program.
flicker bit	A bit that is programmed to turn ON and OFF at a specific frequency.
floating-point decimal	A decimal number expressed as a number (the mantissa) multiplied by a power of 10, e.g., 0.538×10^{-5} .
force reset	The process of forcibly turning OFF a bit via a programming device. Bits are usually turned OFF as a result of program execution.
force set	The process of forcibly turning ON a bit via a programming device. Bits are usually turned ON as a result of program execution.
forced status	The status of bits that have been force reset or force set.
frame checksum	The results of exclusive ORing all data within a specified calculation range. The frame checksum can be calculated on both the sending and receiving end of a data transfer to confirm that data was transmitted correctly.
function code	A two-digit number used to input an instruction into the PC.
hardware error	An error originating in the hardware structure (electronic components) of the PC, as opposed to a software error, which originates in software (i.e., programs).
header code	A code in an instruction that specifies what the instruction is to do.
hexadecimal	A number system where all numbers are expressed to the base 16. In a PC all data is ultimately stored in binary form, however, displays and inputs on Programming Devices are often expressed in hexadecimal to simplify operation. Each group of four binary bits is numerically equivalent to one hexadecimal digit.
host computer	A computer that is used to transfer data to or receive data from a PC in a Host Link system. The host computer is used for data management and overall system control. Host computers are generally small personal or business computers.
host interface	An interface that allows communications with a host computer.
host link	An interface connecting a PC to a host computer to enable monitoring or program control from the host computer.
HR area	A memory area that preserves bit status during power interrupts and used as work bits in programming.
I/O bit	A bit in memory used to hold I/O status. Input bits reflect the status of input terminals; output bits hold the status for output terminals.

I/O capacity	The number of inputs and outputs that a PC is able to handle. This number ranges from around one hundred for smaller PCs to two thousand for the largest ones.
I/O delay	The delay in time from when a signal is sent to an output to when the status of the output is actually in effect or the delay in time from when the status of an input changes until the signal indicating the change in the status is received.
I/O device	A device connected to the I/O terminals on I/O Units. I/O devices may be either part of the Control System, if they function to help control other devices, or they may be part of the controlled system.
I/O interrupt	An interrupt generated by a signal from I/O.
I/O point	The place at which an input signal enters the PC System, or at which an output signal leaves the PC System. In physical terms, I/O points correspond to terminals or connector pins on a Unit; in terms of programming, an I/O points correspond to I/O bits in the IR area.
I/O refreshing	The process of updating output status sent to external devices so that it agrees with the status of output bits held in memory and of updating input bits in memory so that they agree with the status of inputs from external devices.
I/O response time	The time required for an output signal to be sent from the PC in response to an input signal received from an external device.
I/O Unit	The Units in a PC that are physically connected to I/O devices to input and output signals. I/O Units include Input Units and Output Units, each of which is available in a range of specifications.
I/O word	A word in the IR area that is allocated to a Unit in the PC System and is used to hold I/O status for that Unit.
IBM PC/AT or compatible	A computer that has similar architecture to, that is logically compatible with, and that can run software designed for an IBM PC/AT computer.
increment	Increasing a numeric value, usually by 1.
indirect address	An address whose contents indicates another address. The contents of the second address will be used as the actual operand.
initialization error	An error that occurs either in hardware or software during the PC System startup, i.e., during initialization.
initialize	Part of the startup process whereby some memory areas are cleared, system setup is checked, and default values are set.
input	The signal coming from an external device into the PC. The term input is often used abstractly or collectively to refer to incoming signals.
input bit	A bit in the IR area that is allocated to hold the status of an input.
input device	An external device that sends signals into the PC System.
input point	The point at which an input enters the PC System. Input points correspond physically to terminals or connector pins.
input signal	A change in the status of a connection entering the PC. Generally an input signal is said to exist when, for example, a connection point goes from low to high voltage or from a nonconductive to a conductive state.
install	The preparation necessary to use a program or software package, such as the LSS or SSS, on a computer.

instruction	A direction given in the program that tells the PC of the action to be carried out, and the data to be used in carrying out the action. Instructions can be used to simply turn a bit ON or OFF, or they can perform much more complex actions, such as converting and/or transferring large blocks of data.
instruction block	A group of instructions that is logically related in a ladder-diagram program. A logic block includes all of the instruction lines that interconnect with each other from one or more line connecting to the left bus bar to one or more right-hand instructions connecting to the right bus bar.
instruction execution time	The time required to execute an instruction. The execution time for any one instruction can vary with the execution conditions for the instruction and the operands used in it.
instruction line	A group of conditions that lie together on the same horizontal line of a ladder diagram. Instruction lines can branch apart or join together to form instruction blocks. Also called a rung.
interface	An interface is the conceptual boundary between systems or devices and usually involves changes in the way the communicated data is represented. Interface devices perform operations like changing the coding, format, or speed of the data.
interlock	A programming method used to treat a number of instructions as a group so that the entire group can be reset together when individual execution is not required. An interlocked program section is executed normally for an ON execution condition and partially reset for an OFF execution condition.
interrupt (signal)	A signal that stops normal program execution and causes a subroutine to be run or other processing to take place.
interrupt program	A program that is executed in response to an interrupt.
inverse condition	See <i>normally closed condition</i> .
JIS	An acronym for Japanese Industrial Standards.
jump	A type of programming where execution moves directly from one point in a program to another, without sequentially executing any instructions in between.
jump number	A definer used with a jump that defines the points from and to which a jump is to be made.
ladder diagram (program)	A form of program arising out of relay-based control systems that uses circuit-type diagrams to represent the logic flow of programming instructions. The appearance of the program is similar to a ladder, and thus the name.
ladder diagram symbol	A symbol used in drawing a ladder-diagram program.
ladder instruction	An instruction that represents the conditions on a ladder-diagram program. The other instructions in a ladder diagram fall along the right side of the diagram and are called terminal instructions.
Ladder Support Software	A software package installed on a IBM PC/AT or compatible computer to function as a Programming Device.
least-significant (bit/word)	See <i>rightmost (bit/word)</i> .
LED	Acronym for light-emitting diode; a device used as for indicators or displays.
leftmost (bit/word)	The highest numbered bits of a group of bits, generally of an entire word, or the highest numbered words of a group of words. These bits/words are often called most-significant bits/words.

link	A hardware or software connection formed between two Units. "Link" can refer either to a part of the physical connection between two Units or a software connection created to data existing at another location (i.e., data links).
load	The processes of copying data either from an external device or from a storage area to an active portion of the system such as a display buffer. Also, an output device connected to the PC is called a load.
logic block	A group of instructions that is logically related in a ladder-diagram program and that requires logic block instructions to relate it to other instructions or logic blocks.
logic block instruction	An instruction used to locally combine the execution condition resulting from a logic block with a current execution condition. The current execution condition could be the result of a single condition, or of another logic block. AND Load and OR Load are the two logic block instructions.
logic instruction	Instructions used to logically combine the content of two words and output the logical results to a specified result word. The logic instructions combine all the same-numbered bits in the two words and output the result to the bit of the same number in the specified result word.
LR area	A data area that is used in data links.
LSS	See <i>Ladder Support Software</i> .
main program	All of a program except for subroutine and interrupt programs.
mark trace	A process in which changes in the contents of specific memory locations are recorded during program execution.
masked bit	A bit whose status has been temporarily made ineffective.
masking	'Covering' an interrupt signal so that the interrupt is not effective until the mask is removed.
megabyte	A unit of storage equal to one million bytes.
memory area	Any of the areas in the PC used to hold data or programs.
message number	A number assigned to a message generated with the MESSAGE instruction.
mnemonic code	A form of a ladder-diagram program that consists of a sequential list of the instructions without using a ladder diagram.
MONITOR mode	A mode of PC operation in which normal program execution is possible, and which allows modification of data held in memory. Used for monitoring or debugging the PC.
most-significant (bit/word)	See <i>leftmost (bit/word)</i> .
NC input	An input that is normally closed, i.e., the input signal is considered to be present when the circuit connected to the input opens.
negative delay	A delay set for a data trace in which recording data begins before the trace signal by a specified amount.
nesting	Programming one loop within another loop, programming a call to a subroutine within another subroutine, or programming one jump within another.
NO input	An input that is normally open, i.e., the input signal is considered to be present when the circuit connected to the input closes.
noise interference	Disturbances in signals caused by electrical noise.

nonfatal error	A hardware or software error that produces a warning but does not stop the PC from operating.
normal condition	See <i>normally open condition</i> .
normally closed condition	A condition that produces an ON execution condition when the bit assigned to it is OFF, and an OFF execution condition when the bit assigned to it is ON.
normally open condition	A condition that produces an ON execution condition when the bit assigned to it is ON, and an OFF execution condition when the bit assigned to it is OFF.
NOT	A logic operation which inverts the status of the operand. For example, AND NOT indicates an AND operation with the opposite of the actual status of the operand bit.
OFF	The status of an input or output when a signal is said not to be present. The OFF state is generally represented by a low voltage or by non-conductivity, but can be defined as the opposite of either.
OFF delay	The delay between the time when a signal is switched OFF (e.g., by an input device or PC) and the time when the signal reaches a state readable as an OFF signal (i.e., as no signal) by a receiving party (e.g., output device or PC).
offset	A positive or negative value added to a base value such as an address to specify a desired value.
ON	The status of an input or output when a signal is said to be present. The ON state is generally represented by a high voltage or by conductivity, but can be defined as the opposite of either.
ON delay	The delay between the time when an ON signal is initiated (e.g., by an input device or PC) and the time when the signal reaches a state readable as an ON signal by a receiving party (e.g., output device or PC).
one-shot bit	A bit that is turned ON or OFF for a specified interval of time which is longer than one scan.
one-to-one link	See <i>1:1 link</i> .
online edit	The process of changed the program directly in the PC from a Programming Device. Online editing is possible in PROGRAM or MONITOR mode. In MONITOR mode, the program can actually be changed while it is being
operand	The values designated as the data to be used for an instruction. An operand can be input as a constant expressing the actual numeric value to be used or as an address to express the location in memory of the data to be used.
operand bit	A bit designated as an operand for an instruction.
operand word	A word designated as an operand for an instruction.
operating modes	One of three PC modes: <i>PROGRAM mode</i> , <i>MONITOR mode</i> , and <i>RUN mode</i> .
operating error	An error that occurs during actual PC operation as opposed to an initialization error, which occurs before actual operations can begin.
OR	A logic operation whereby the result is true if either of two premises is true, or if both are true. In ladder-diagram programming the premises are usually ON/OFF states of bits or the logical combination of such states called execution conditions.
output	The signal sent from the PC to an external device. The term output is often used abstractly or collectively to refer to outgoing signals.

output bit	A bit in the IR area that is allocated to hold the status to be sent to an output device.
output device	An external device that receives signals from the PC System.
output point	The point at which an output leaves the PC System. Output points correspond physically to terminals or connector pins.
output signal	A signal being sent to an external device. Generally an output signal is said to exist when, for example, a connection point goes from low to high voltage or from a nonconductive to a conductive state.
overflow	The state where the capacity of a data storage location has been exceeded.
overseeing	Part of the processing performed by the CPU Unit that includes general tasks required to operate the PC.
overwrite	Changing the content of a memory location so that the previous content is lost.
parity	Adjustment of the number of ON bits in a word or other unit of data so that the total is always an even number or always an odd number. Parity is generally used to check the accuracy of data after being transmitted by confirming that the number of ON bits is still even or still odd.
parity check	Checking parity to ensure that transmitted data has not been corrupted.
PC	See <i>Programmable Controller</i> .
PC configuration	The arrangement and interconnections of the Units that are put together to form a functional PC.
PC System	With building-block PCs, all of the Units connected up to, but not including, the I/O devices. The boundaries of a PC System are the PC and the program in its CPU Unit at the upper end; and the I/O Units at the lower end.
PCB	See <i>printed circuit board</i> .
PC Setup	A group of operating parameters set in the PC from a Programming Device to control PC operation.
Peripheral Device	Devices connected to a PC System to aid in system operation. Peripheral devices include printers, programming devices, external storage media, etc.
peripheral servicing	Processing signals to and from peripheral devices, including refreshing, communications processing, interrupts, etc.
port	A connector on a PC or computer that serves as a connection to an external device.
positive delay	A delay set for a data trace in which recording data begins after the trace signal by a specified amount.
Power Supply Unit	A Unit that connected to a PC that provides power at the voltage required by the other Units.
present value	The current value registered in a device at any instant during its operation. Present value is abbreviated as PV. The use of this term is generally restricted to timers and counters.
printed circuit board	A board onto which electrical circuits are printed for mounting into a computer or electrical device.
PROGRAM mode	A mode of operation that allows inputting and debugging of programs to be carried out, but that does not permit normal execution of the program.

Programmable Controller	A computerized device that can accept inputs from external devices and generate outputs to external devices according to a program held in memory. Programmable Controllers are used to automate control of external devices. Although single-unit Programmable Controllers are available, building-block Programmable Controllers are constructed from separate components. Such Programmable Controllers are formed only when enough of these separate components are assembled to form a functional assembly.
programmed alarm	An alarm given as a result of execution of an instruction designed to generate the alarm in the program, as opposed to one generated by the system.
programmed error	An error arising as a result of the execution of an instruction designed to generate the error in the program, as opposed to one generated by the system.
programmed message	A message generated as a result of execution of an instruction designed to generate the message in the program, as opposed to one generated by the system.
Programming Console	The portable form of Programming Device for a PC.
Programming Device	A Peripheral Device used to input a program into a PC or to alter or monitor a program already held in the PC. There are dedicated programming devices, such as Programming Consoles, and there are non-dedicated devices, such as a host computer.
PROM	Programmable read-only memory; a type of ROM into which the program or data may be written after manufacture, by a customer, but which is fixed from that time on.
prompt	A message or symbol that appears on a display to request input from the operator.
protocol	The parameters and procedures that are standardized to enable two devices to communicate or to enable a programmer or operator to communicate with a device.
PV	See <i>present value</i> .
RAM	Random access memory; a data storage media. RAM will not retain data when power is disconnected.
RAS	An acronym for reliability, assurance, safety.
read-only area	A memory area from which the user can read status but to which data cannot be written.
refresh	The process of updating output status sent to external devices so that it agrees with the status of output bits held in memory and of updating input bits in memory so that they agree with the status of inputs from external devices.
relay-based control	The forerunner of PCs. In relay-based control, groups of relays are interconnected to form control circuits. In a PC, these are replaced by programmable circuits.
reserved bit	A bit that is not available for user application.
reserved word	A word in memory that is reserved for a special purpose and cannot be accessed by the user.
reset	The process of turning a bit or signal OFF or of changing the present value of a timer or counter to its set value or to zero.
response code	A code sent with the response to a data transmission that specifies how the transmitted data was processed.

response format	A format specifying the data required in a response to a data transmission.
response monitoring time	The time a device will wait for a response to a data transmission before assuming that an error has occurred.
Restart Bit	A bit used to restart part of a PC.
result word	A word used to hold the results from the execution of an instruction.
retrieve	The processes of copying data either from an external device or from a storage area to an active portion of the system such as a display buffer. Also, an output device connected to the PC is called a load.
retry	The process whereby a device will re-transmit data which has resulted in an error message from the receiving device.
return	The process by which instruction execution shifts from a subroutine back to the main program (usually the point from which the subroutine was called).
reversible counter	A counter that can be both incremented and decremented depending on the specified conditions.
reversible shift register	A shift register that can shift data in either direction depending on the specified conditions.
right-hand instruction	See <i>terminal instruction</i> .
rightmost (bit/word)	The lowest numbered bits of a group of bits, generally of an entire word, or the lowest numbered words of a group of words. These bits/words are often called least-significant bits/words.
rising edge	The point where a signal actually changes from an OFF to an ON status.
ROM	Read only memory; a type of digital storage that cannot be written to. A ROM chip is manufactured with its program or data already stored in it and can never be changed. However, the program or data can be read as many times as desired.
rotate register	A shift register in which the data moved out from one end is placed back into the shift register at the other end.
RS-232C interface	An industry standard for serial communications.
RUN mode	The operating mode used by the PC for normal control operations.
rung	See <i>instruction line</i> .
scan	The process used to execute a ladder-diagram program. The program is examined sequentially from start to finish and each instruction is executed in turn based on execution conditions.
scan time	See <i>cycle time</i> .
scheduled interrupt	An interrupt that is automatically generated by the system at a specific time or program location specified by the operator. Scheduled interrupts result in the execution of specific subroutines that can be used for instructions that must be executed repeatedly at a specified interval of time.
SCP	See <i>subtract count input</i> .
seal	See <i>self-maintaining bit</i> .
self diagnosis	A process whereby the system checks its own operation and generates a warning or error if an abnormality is discovered.

self-maintaining bit	A bit that is programmed to maintain either an OFF or ON status until set or reset by specified conditions.
series	A wiring method in which Units are wired consecutively in a string.
servicing	The process whereby the PC checks a connector or Unit to see if special processing is required.
set	The process of turning a bit or signal ON.
set value	The value from which a decrementing counter starts counting down or to which an incrementing counter counts up (i.e., the maximum count), or the time from which or for which a timer starts timing. Set value is abbreviated SV.
shift input signal	An input signal whose OFF to ON transition causes data to be shifted one bit.
shift register	One or more words in which data is shifted a specified number of units to the right or left in bit, digit, or word units. In a rotate register, data shifted out one end is shifted back into the other end. In other shift registers, new data (either specified data, zero(s) or one(s)) is shifted into one end and the data shifted out at the other end is lost.
signed binary	A binary value that is stored in memory along with a bit that indicates whether the value is positive or negative.
software error	An error that originates in a software program.
software protect	A means of protecting data from being changed that uses software as opposed to a physical switch or other hardware setting.
source (word)	The location from which data is taken for use in an instruction, as opposed to the location to which the result of an instruction is to be written. The latter is called the destination.
special instruction	An instruction input with a function code that handles data processing operations within ladder diagrams, as opposed to a basic instruction, which makes up the fundamental portion of a ladder diagram.
SR area	A memory area containing flags and other bits/words with specific functions.
SSS	See <i>SYSMAC Support Software</i> .
store	The process of recording a program written into a display buffer permanently in memory.
subroutine	A group of instructions placed separate from the main program and executed only when called from the main program or activated by an interrupt.
subroutine number	A definer used to identify the subroutine that a subroutine call or interrupt activates.
subtract count input	An input signal used to decrement a counter when the signal changes from OFF to ON.
SV	See <i>set value</i> .
switching capacity	The maximum voltage/current that a relay can safely switch on and off.
synchronous execution	Execution of programs and servicing operations in which program execution and servicing are synchronized so that all servicing operations are executed each time the programs are executed.
syntax	The form of a program statement (as opposed to its meaning).

syntax error	An error in the way in which a program is written. Syntax errors can include 'spelling' mistakes (i.e., a function code that does not exist), mistakes in specifying operands within acceptable parameters (e.g., specifying read-only bits as a destination), and mistakes in actual application of instructions (e.g., a call to a subroutine that does not exist).
SYSMAC Support Software	A software package installed on a IBM PC/AT or compatible computer to function as a Programming Device.
system configuration	The arrangement in which Units in a System are connected. This term refers to the conceptual arrangement and wiring together of all the devices needed to comprise the System.
system error	An error generated by the system, as opposed to one resulting from execution of an instruction designed to generate an error.
system error message	An error message generated by the system, as opposed to one resulting from execution of an instruction designed to generate a message.
system setup	Operating environment settings for a Programming Device, e.g., the LSS or SSS.
terminal instruction	An instruction placed on the right side of a ladder diagram that uses the final execution conditions of an instruction line.
timer	A location in memory accessed through a TIM/CNT bit and used to time down from the timer's set value. Timers are turned ON and reset according to their execution conditions.
TR area	A data area used to store execution conditions so that they can be reloaded later for use with other instructions.
TR bit	A bit in the TR area.
trace	An operation whereby the program is executed and the resulting data is stored to enable step-by-step analysis and debugging.
trace memory	A memory area used to store the results of trace operations.
transfer	The process of moving data from one location to another within the PC, or between the PC and external devices. When data is transferred, generally a copy of the data is sent to the destination, i.e., the content of the source of the transfer is not changed.
transmission distance	The distance that a signal can be transmitted.
trigger	A signal used to activate some process, e.g., the execution of a trace operation.
trigger address	An address in the program that defines the beginning point for tracing. The actual beginning point can be altered from the trigger by defining either a positive or negative delay.
UM area	The memory area used to hold the active program, i.e., the program that is being currently executed.
Unit	In OMRON PC terminology, the word Unit is capitalized to indicate any product sold for a PC System. Most of the names of these products end with the word Unit.
unit number	A number assigned to some Units to facilitate identification when assigning words or other operating parameters.
unmasked bit	A bit whose status is effective. See <i>masked bit</i> .

unsigned binary	A binary value that is stored in memory without any indication of whether it is positive or negative.
uploading	The process of transferring a program or data from a lower-level or slave computer to a higher-level or host computer. If a Programming Device is involved, the Programming Device is considered the host computer.
watchdog timer	A timer within the system that ensures that the scan time stays within specified limits. When limits are reached, either warnings are given or PC operation is stopped depending on the particular limit that is reached.
WDT	See <i>watchdog timer</i> .
word	A unit of data storage in memory that consists of 16 bits. All data areas consists of words. Some data areas can be accessed only by words; others, by either words or bits.
word address	The location in memory where a word of data is stored. A word address must specify (sometimes by default) the data area and the number of the word that is being addressed.
work area	A part of memory containing work words/bits.
work bit	A bit in a work word.
work word	A word that can be used for data calculation or other manipulation in programming, i.e., a 'work space' in memory. A large portion of the IR area is always reserved for work words. Parts of other areas not required for special purposes may also be used as work words.
write protect switch	A switch used to write-protect the contents of a storage device, e.g., a floppy disk. If the hole on the upper left of a floppy disk is open, the information on this floppy disk cannot be altered.
write-protect	A state in which the contents of a storage device can be read but cannot be altered.
